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LOCAL RECORD.

WHO WILL BEAT.—Capt Irvine's telegram to Salem for the six northern companies of the 2d regiment stirred up Salem in a lively manner, and now they propose to get the companies there if possible. Col Smith gave his consent to their coming to Albany if the consent of the commanding officers of each company can be secured. This means a contest in order to secure them. Here are some remarks from a subject article in the *Statesman* on the subject: "Now, this state of affairs brings Salem to a point of either showing her ability to hold a celebration and keep the military companies of the county at home, or else stand back like a bump on a log and see her people go away from home to have a good time. Marion county has three military companies and it would look exceedingly shabby if they were allowed to be drawn to a celebration in a place where there is only one. The military companies at Macleay and Whiteaker will much rather come to Salem and participate, where their presence will be appreciated, aside from the influence they will have in bringing a crowd, rather than go to some remote spot, where they will be reckoned only according to their 'drawing' powers. The same is true of the home company, and surely the Corvallis company ought to be more willing to come here than to go to Albany, all things considered." First come first served should be the rule, as it was last year.

DIAMOND MYSTERY.—Probably seven hundred people were present last night at the first performance of the Chicago Comedy Company, and from the great satisfaction given a large house each night of their engagement may be predicted. "Diamond Mystery," a thrilling drama, full of comedy, was presented in fine shape. The cast is a good one. Jas A Develin as Peter Grump has never had his superior in Albany in that style of a character. He is simply enormous. Val E Love as Jim Brandon does the heavy part well. Belle Inman was cut out for Polly Perkins and fills the play with life. Miss Virginia Snow and Mr Mortimer Snow made a good couple and do their work in a manner to please the audience, in some respects the most difficult parts in a play. It takes good acting to make love well. Chas Patterson does the dandy in an artistic manner. Mr Hays, the pianist, handles the keys in a manner not often duplicated in Albany. To-night "Cotton King" and "Is Marriage a Failure," to-morrow night, "Facing the Enemy."

THOSE HOT SPRINGS.—We mentioned several days ago about some hot springs a few miles from Breitenbush, where a summer resort will probably some day spring up. Since then we have learned that the land on which the springs are located, are held by Claude Mansfield, formerly of this city. Claude has built a residence on the same and is holding the fine property down in good shape. Attempts have been made to jump the same; but without success. As the land in that vicinity has not been surveyed it takes a constant occupancy to keep property, and this young Mansfield is making a business, besides cultivating the land with the purpose of making a good farm out of it; but with such valuable springs on it it is bound to become something more some day.

THE ICE WORKS.—The machinery for the ice works arrived this morning from San Francisco, and will be placed in position as soon as the building is completed. The works will be ready for business in about a month. The new machinery weighs 4,500 pounds. The shafting and such things are being manufactured in Albany. The process of manufacturing ice is a scientific one, as well as of a very interesting nature.

A JAIL BREAK.

James Bannan, the Bank Robber, Makes His Escape from the County Jail.

Last evening about 9:30 o'clock Sheriff Smallmon, accompanied by one of his little girls, went down stairs from their rooms in the county jail, to lock the three prisoners in their cells. The Sheriff stepped into the corridor, to perform the operation, when James Bannan, the Lebanon bank robber, and John Wilson, the man who broke into Shultz Bros. meat market, who were standing at the door of the first cell, grappled with the Sheriff and succeeded in getting him into the cell and bolting the heavy door to it. Then they fled from the corridor; but the front door being locked they sped up stairs and down the back way into the wood shed, where Wilson, who was bareheaded with no coat on remained, while Bannan, who had his hat and coat on, passed out into the open air and fled across the Court House yard towards the Congregational Church. In the meantime, Mr Smallmon's little girl rushed into the corridor and unlocked the cell door. The Sheriff rushed to the front door, unlocked it, and getting a sight of Bannan crossing the lot fled twice. Wilson was found in the wood shed and taken to his cell. Bannan passed west along 4th street. Mr Merrill Phillips met him, and asked him what was the matter over at the jail. He said "I'll be d-d if I know," and ran at full speed west. At the Indian camp near the city cemetery he attempted to steal a cayuse, belonging to the camp, but was frightened away and ran towards the Calipsoo, disappearing in the dark. A posse of men started in pursuit, but no other clue was obtained during the night.

Bannan is about thirty-five years of age, 6 feet tall, of a large, bony frame, light mustache and eyes, and was dressed in dark clothes, with light cow boy hat with a leather band.

John Ericson who was in his cell at the 'Imed did not make any attempt to escape. This afternoon Sheriff Smallmon received a dispatch asking him to come to Lebanon at once, followed by another to come quick, and he immediately went. It was thought Bannan had been captured or seen; but just as we go to press we get the following:

LEBANON, OR., May 14th, 3:30 p. m.—No reliable news about Bannan.

A BRAVE ENGINEER.—As last Friday evening's north bound train was approaching this city the engineer noticed an old lady starting to cross the track at one end of the crosswalks. He blew the whistle sharply and the old lady paid no attention. By this time the train was thundering along and the old lady just about to step between the rails. The engineer seeing that it would be impossible to stop the engine in time to save her, rapidly crawled to the front, got down on the cowcatcher and as the immense engine seemed to strike the lady he grabbed her by the arm and flung her to one side, saving her from a horrible death. On the train stopping the old lady was picked up and proved to be Mrs Spring. With the exception of a little lameness she was all right. —McMinnville Reporter.

WAS IN PORTLAND.—Milton Hale, one of the heaviest capitalists of Linn county, was in the city last Wednesday. Mr Hale was the first man who settled in Oregon south of the Santiam river. He located on a claim one mile below where Jefferson is now situated in the fall of 1845, with his family. He now resides on a beautiful farm adjoining Albany on the east, where he enjoys the fruit of a life of an honest and well directed industry. —Sunday Mercury.
