TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

The Elections.
HELENA, Mont., May 15.—The returns of yesterday's election are too incomplete to determine the exact membership of the constitutional convention.

The returns, as far as received, indicate that the contest was very close with the chances in favor of the democrats by a narrow majority. The labor member from Jefferson county may have the casting vote.

SEATTLE, May 15.—The returns of yesterday's election are by no means complete but enough is known to warrant the statement that the constitutional convention will be a feely republican. It is estimated here that there will be forty four republicans to thirty one democrats in the convention.

Watkins Suit.
PORTLAND, Or., May 15.—The suit of W. H. Watkins against the Southern Pacific railroad company for damages came up this morning, and the court denies the motion for judgement on the pleading and want of reply. Watkins claims he was precipitated to the ground at the town of Lebanon, while attempting to get aboard a train belonging to the defendant, by reason of a short turn in the sidewalk, at which place there was no light, and he sustained several broken ribs and loss of valuable time.

The Walking Match.
SAN FRANCISCO, May 15.—The six days go as you please race ended at 10 o'clock this evening. The following "peds" were on the track at the finish: James Albert is "winner," score 533 miles; Gus Guerrero, 525; Sport Campagna, 549; Doffy Goofy, 211; Crozier, 455; Peterson, 400; Skinner, 268. Albert received 60 per cent, and Guerrero 40 per cent, of half of the gate receipts.

Will Not Be Removed.
SAN FRANCISCO, May 15.—A special to the Examiner from Washington says presidential postmasters will be allowed to serve out their four year terms from the date of confirmation by the senate. Postmaster general Wanamaker made this plain to-day by stating that "the president is not making removals except for cause." He added that to displace a postmaster before his term expired would be removal.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Marella Hermann, of Oregon, has been appointed chief of a division in the pension office.
