WASHINGTON, May 27.—The president this  
evening made the following appointments:  
Hiram Smith, Jr., of Cameron, Mo., to be  
first deputy commissioner of pensions,

secretary of New Mexico.  
Robert S. Anderson, of Baker City, Or., to  
be commissioner in and for the district of Alaska  
to reside at Oumalaka.  
Hale J. Cole, of Spokane Falls, W. T., to be  
agent for the Indians of the Colville agency in  
Washington territory.  
To be register of the land office: John Ap-  
person, of Oregon City, Oregon, at Oregon  
City; Herbert Brown, of Arizona, at Tucson,  
Ariz.  
To be receiver of public moneys, John V.  
Scott, of California, at Shasta Cala.

**MIRIA Called Out.**  
CHICAGO, May 27.—A special dispatch  
from Braidwood, Ill., the scene of the trouble  
with the striking coal miners, says: In response  
to an appeal by the sheriff of Will county for  
armed reinforcements, Governor Fifer has autho-  
rized the Illinois National Guard to protect  
the property and persons endangered by the  
riot at Braidwood. Adjutant General Vance  
has ordered a regiment of men to aid the  
sheriff.

**Will Go to Alaska.**  
NEW YORK, May 27.—Ex-Senator Thomas  
C. Platt and General Russell A. Alger have de-  
cided to spend the summer in Alaska. They  
leave this city June 20 in General Alger's  
private car, Michigan. They will journey by  
rail to Tacoma, where they will take a steamer  
to Alaska. Platt will be Alger's guest on the  
trip. They expect to be away two months or  
more. Various reasons are assigned for the  
contemplated journey.

**Got 50 cents.**  
DAYTON, May 27.—Group Bro's. safe was  
burglarized Saturday night. A hole was bored  
in the Hall safe, and the door blown off, and  
50 cents was stolen. A number of suspicious  
characters are in town, and the committee of  
safety is on the lookout.

NEW YORK, May 27.—Dr. Tanner, the

buried alive, and at the end of four weeks taken  
up and resuscitated.
