The object of this association to be to garner and preserve facts of the early history of our country. Many incidents may be gathered at these meetings that will be of great interest and value to the historian that cannot be found anywhere else. If the young men of this county will take hold of this suggestion and carry it into effect by continually exercising themselves in pioneer literature they may be of great benefit by gleaming historical data and reap a great deal of pleasure in the annual meetings held in connection with our worthy pioneers. For several days last week no work was done on our Narrow Gauge road, other than pulling the mail. A committee from the employees of the road had gone to Portland to interview the Receiver, to see whether they could get any money. We venture the assertion that more than half of the employees on this side have from six months upward of wages due them. It seems they could get no satisfaction and Monday of this week all hands went off on a strike. We understand the Receiver secured a full crew for the train at Portland to take the places of the strikers, but when they reached Ray's Landing and learned the true state of affairs, they, the new crew, refused to take hold. So now the Narrow Gauge is dead for the time being. It is a marvel to us that the hands have not taken this step a long time ago. Under the Receiver's administration the employees have never been treated like humans, nor has the road ever been conducted by him on any kind of business principles. It is to be hoped that the employees of the road will be entirely successful in their strike and that some of the rottenness of the management and manager will be exposed to the gaze of the entire public. We here, of course, suffer considerable inconvenience especially on account of our mail; but are willing to undergo a great deal, if it will assist the employees of this poor excuse for a railroad to secure a part of the rights due human beings.

Friday evening at the City Hall the local Teacher's Institute was called to order by Vice President, Prof. I. D. Boyer, now Secretary of the Eagle Woolen Mill Co., of this place. The exercises for the evening consisted of an able address delivered by Rev. Elworthy pastor of the M. E. Church here. Subject, "Relation of Patrons to the Schools," and vocal music and declamations by the little folks, pupils of the North Brownsville graded school, a very successful year of which under the tutelage of Prof. Hall was brought to a close last evening. Saturday morning was spent in discussing various questions propounded by Supt. Curl and the subject of Orthography opened by Prof. Russell, of Halsey. The afternoon was spent in discussing the different branches taught in our public school and the different modes of teaching them. The subjects were all well and ably discussed, to the credit of the teachers be it said, that they all seem to take great interest in the discussions. Saturday evening Prof. L. L. Say, late of Pennsylvania delivered an address on the "Problem of Our Country" and more music and recitations were listened to. There were quite a number of teachers present. They adjourned and will hold their next meeting three weeks from last Saturday at Halsey. These institutions are of much benefit doubtless to our local teachers and we are glad to note the interest manifest in them. There is no profession where a higher grade of proficiency is necessary than that of the school teacher and none we think that has more room for improvement.
