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LOCAL RECORD.

COL. COPELAND.—From Alliance to Ypsilanti, all over the United States Col. F. Copeland has been recalled to deliver his sparkling lectures from 3 to 5 as high as 10 times, always being royally received, as he should be in Albany on Thursday and Friday evenings of next week. Here is a notice from the *Albany Times*, after his third visit there: "Col. Copeland is a polished and accomplished speaker, and has many natural endowments that specially fit him for his profession. The fame of the gentleman had preceded him, and the lecture delivered last evening we think will only confirm the opinion generally expressed that Col. Copeland is one of the most brilliant and successful lecturers on the platform. His lecture last evening was a most happy effort, and kept the audience in rare good humor for about two hours. IN ASTORIA.—D. B. Monteith, of Albany, and E. Ford and C. Kennedy, of the Oregon Pacific railroad, were in the city yesterday, resting in real estate. Mr. Kennedy stated to a *Pioneer* reporter, in answer to the question as to the terminus of the Chicago & Northwestern, that in his opinion the road was pushing toward Astoria. He has so much confidence in the belief that the road will come to Astoria that he invested in considerable property yesterday. He further stated that a number of Albany and Corvallis capitalists were coming to Astoria to invest, providing real estate was not too high. *Pioneer.*

The ease with which pension frauds are committed, under circumstances that favor a swindle, can be seen by a case unearthed recently. The widow of an Andersonville victim got a pension of \$95 a month in 1871. She married again and died in 1873. Her man took her papers and married a woman who was made to personate her until he died in 1877. She took up with another man, who learned the story and made her continue the swindle against her will. When they separated in 1888 she ceased drawing the pension and an investigation revealed these facts. Since 1873, for fifteen years, a fraudulent pension has been paid, amounting to \$6480.
