The exercises were opened by a song of praise by the congregation, followed by a Bible lesson by Mrs. Henrietta Brown, and prayer by Mrs. Newell, of Salem. Miss Warren read her annual report, and from it we gathered that this branch of work had not prospered this year, except in a few towns. Eugene has a strong organization, which really does more effective work than the mother union; so also, has Astoria and The Dalles. Pendleton, Halsey, Corvallis and Albany, had good live Unions. Several hereto well to do Unions, have suspended. So many societies are being formed in the churches, such as Christian Endeavor Societies, etc., as to completely monopolize the time of the young people, hence the difficulty in keeping up another organization. Miss Warren said she had utterly failed to get responses to the many letters she had sent out, and she had thought the difficulty might be in the U. S. mail service. The first letters sent had been under Democratic administration, the second under Republican; but still no answer. She was now anxiously waiting a Prohibition administration to set things right.

The Band of Hope under the efficient management of Mrs. Steves and Miss Parvin, of Salem, gave some unique recitations and two little girls sang solos. Their voices showed rare culture. Seldom, if ever, have we seen as well drilled children.

Papers, recitations and solos by young ladies from Astoria, Eugene, The Dalles, and other places, interspersed with quartets and solos under the supervision of Prof. Parvin filled to overflowing the evening. Mrs. Narcissa White Kinney made one of her happy, characteristic talks in asking for a collection, after which the benediction was pronounced by Rev. Deane.

At the regular meeting of the Union on Tuesday last plans for the dinner to be given on the 4th were discussed.

A committee was appointed to purchase window blinds for the front windows of the hall. These blinds have long been needed and will add much to the appearance and comfort of the room.
