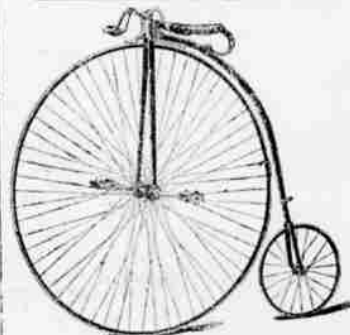

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The vacancy on the United States Supreme
bench, caused by the death of Justice Matthews,
has been long unfilled. It has been generally
expected that Judge Gresham would be pro-
moted to the vacant chair. But there is a
custom, very rarely broken upon, that a vacan-
cy on the Supreme bench should be filled by
the appointment of some one resident in the
district where the vacancy occurs. Matthews'
district was Ohio, Kentucky, Tennessee and
Michigan. To appoint any out of these four
states would violate the usual Supreme Court
succession. It is for this reason that neither
Judge Gresham nor Attorney General Miller,
who have been leadingly thought of for this
place, are not likely to be appointed; both being
from Indiana which is not in the circuit where
the vacancy exists, and the probability is that
some Ohio man will be appointed.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

The Seattle Fire.

SEATTLE, June 8.—The queen city of the
Sound presents an appalling sight this evening.
The awful disaster swept down upon it so sud-
denly that in less than twelve hours 120 acres
of the business portion of the city were wiped
out of existence, nothing remaining to-night
but blackened walls where two days ago were
busy scenes of business activity.

Sixty-three safes were counted in the ruins
south of Vesler building along to-day. Most
of them seem to be unimpaired. In the im-
mense brick vault of Dexter, Horton & Co.'s
bank, which stands uninjured save by heat, in
the middle of the ruins of the bank building,
there are locked up \$1,200,000. But two
churches were burned, the Episcopal and
Methodist Protestant.

A detailed statement of the loss cannot pos-
sibly at this time be made. It is believed, how-
ever, that the losses will be aggregate \$15,000,000.

The burnt district covers as near as can be
estimated, 130 acres of the solid built portion of
the city.

Firemen from Portland, Tacoma and Olym-
pia are here, and playing water on the ruins.

The disposition of the people of every side
is to go ahead and rebuild the city. It is pro-
posed to replant the Southern part, fill it up to
the proper grade, wipe out Commercial street,
extend Front and Second streets to the water
front on the south, and straighten the streets.

Perhaps a Plague.

JOHNSTOWN, June 7.—"Are the horrors of
the flood to give way to the terrors of a plague?"
is the question that is now agitating the valley
of the Conemaugh.

To-day opened warm and almost sultry. The
stretch throughout Johnstown is almost over-
powering. Sickness, in spite of the precau-
tions of the sanitary authorities, is on the in-
crease, and fears of an epidemic grow with
every hour. Five cases of malignant diptheria
were reported this morning in five different
houses on one street, and the health authorities
anticipate typhoid fever and kindred diseases,
especially as the weather is growing warm.

The scarcity of vegetables adds to the danger.
