Quite naturally it is the man of seasoned intellect and ripe experience who does not seem fresh.

The consumption of sugar in the United States last year was 1,362,000 tons of refined and 106,500 tons of raw.

There are 93,090 persons between the ages of 4 and 20 in this state who will draw school money in the state apportionment this year.

The interest with which a young man watches the growth of hair on his upper lip is only equaled by that with which the man of 40 watches its disappearance from the top of his head.

The United States possesses the largest vault and the largest deposit of money in the world. It can hold \$100,000,000, but the prospects are favorable for a call for increased storage of silver. There are about \$20,000,000 in half dollars that do not bud.

The window glass consumption for the last six months of 1888 was the largest ever known, and there were 200,000 more boxes produced than the year previous. The imports were also heavy. The number of pots were increased during the year from 700 to 1000.

The entire potato product of the country in 1888 was 230,000,000 bushels, an increase of 90,000,000 bushels over the crop of 1887. The principal potato producing states are New York, Michigan, Illinois and Minnesota, and Dakota territory.

The supreme court has passed upon the railroad commission question, affirming the decision of the court below. This settles the question against the commission appointed by Governor Penneyer and in favor of the commission elected by the legislature.

It is semi-officially stated that the price of silver during 1888 averaged 93 1/4 cents per ounce, as against 1.01 1/2 in 1887. The decline in the price, it is claimed, caused a direct loss to Colorado mines of \$1,456,738, or the return was that sum less than they would have received for the same ounces of silver during the previous year.

It is a mistake to suppose that because milk is a liquid food it is at the same time drink which is capable of satisfying the thirst of infants. Although milk appeases hunger, it makes thirst more intense after it has remained some time in the stomach and digestion has begun. It is thirst which causes healthy, breast-nursing infants to cry for long periods in many instances. There are many cases of indigestion due to weakness or insufficiency of the child's gastric juice, which would be greatly benefited or even cured if the child were allowed an occasional drink of water.

There is an old colored cobbler in Hartford, Conn., named A. P. Cleggett, who has for twenty-five years devoted himself to collecting and studying the history of rare copper coins. His son is the champion checker player of the State. Mr. Cleggett's collection of coins comprises a nearly complete set of pennies issued from 1793 to 1856. His collection is very valuable and contains many coins almost impossible to obtain. His group of British coppers is very interesting. Some of them date as far back as 1700. Mr. Cleggett is always glad to welcome a well informed numismatist.

The official statistics read at the last Mormon conference in Salt Lake city show that "the church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints" has now 12 apostles, 70 patriarchs, 3919 high priests, 11,805 elders, 2069 priests, 2292 teachers, 11,610 deacons, 81,809 families, 119,915 officers and members, and 49,303 children under eight years of age, a total Mormon population of 153,911. The number of marriages for the six months ended April 6, 1889, was 530; number of births, 2754; new members baptized, 488; ex communications, 113.

OHIO NEGROES KICKING.

The Hon. William Copeland, colored republican member of the legislature, who enjoys the distinction of having received the highest vote ever cast for a colored man in Ohio, says in a public card that the greatest dissatisfaction exists among Ohio colored republicans. Governor Foraker has done less for them than Governor Hoadly did, and the national administration utterly ignores them. Copeland says this is because Harrison personally dislikes the negro. As a result of this snubbing, Ohio blacks have concluded that the republicans only want them for their votes. Copeland says 5000 colored voters will remain away from the polls this fall. This alone would give Hamilton county and the legislature to the democrats. As the incoming legislature will probably serve three years under the new constitutional amendments, which there is little doubt will carry, it will elect successors to both Payne and Sherman. But there is a large and influential class of negroes who insist on positive action, and are circulating a call for a state convention of blacks to nominate a state ticket of their own race. Such a ticket, the first of its kind in any northern state, would poll, it is claimed, 15,000 votes. Copeland says he will not run for the legislature this fall, as he does not believe he can be elected.

It was a sight worth seeing watch young David Dudley Field, who is now approaching 90 years of age, as he ate a hearty dinner, smoked a big cigar and laughed at the jokes of the lawyers and judges at the Silliman banquet at Delmonico's. The great codifier is one of the biggest men in the United States, straight as a ramrod, with the flush of youth still upon his cheeks and hardly looking over 50.
