Friday night some very interesting tight rope performances were given on our streets by the Davidson Brothers.

Friday as the team of Mr. Balch, driven by his son was on its way to the gravel pit, the horses became frightened at the rattling of the loose boards forming the gravel bed and ran into the fence throwing boards and bay off. A severe scalp wound was the only injury done. He was brought to town and had the wound dressed by Dr. W. P. Via.

From private advices we learn that Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Kay landed in Boston on their return from England on the 14th inst. About two more weeks will find them ready to start for home and they are expected to arrive here sometime next week. Their many friends will be glad to learn that Mrs. Kay's health has continued to improve. Their son, Harry, who accompanied them East will not return with them, but will remain with the Davis Furber Machine Co. about three months longer.

113 girls will salute the rising sun here the morning of the glorious 4th. The parade under direction of Marshal Henry will form at the depot at 10 a. m. and proceed to the grove, where among other things an address by Master Miller, of Halsey and an oration by Hon. W. C. Every pioneer in the country should be here with their tents through the 3rd, 4th and 5th, of July and have a grand time. A restaurant guaranteeing good meals will be on the ground

for the accommodation of all, furnishing meals for 25 cents.

Considerable excitement pervades our town on account of the representatives of a large amount of capital having gone up the Calapooia in search of fine timber. Parties representing \$12,000,000 passed through town last week and have located all the available timber on the Calapooia that has been surveyed. A party of eight under direction of Mack Sawyer, who has logged on the creek here for several years, left our town Sunday evening in hopes of finding claims for themselves; but found they were too late. All the vacant timber claims had already been taken by the parties mentioned. People have thought they had plenty of time to take up the timber, but now find capitalists from Michigan have got ahead of them. 'Tis only a question of a few years when a railroad will ascend this creek in quest of the fine timber. The parties who have taken up this timber are also locating all the quartz veins they can find and are making a map of the same. Let it be remembered that Brownsville is located just at the mouth of the Calapooia and when a railroad ascends this creek it will pass through Brownsville—and all the untold wealth along the creek will pass through Brownsville in search of a market.
