

LOCAL RECORD.

A MEDICAL SOCIETY.—Nine Lane county physicians, with the name of Dr. T. W. Harris, at the head, have called a meeting for July 4th, for the formation of a Medical Society, and here is a part of their interesting call: "We conceive the title of physician to be an honorable one and that the profession is not susceptible of division into schools, dogmas or exclusive sects. There can be but one science of medicine, and the true disciple of that science is at liberty, is even bound to transact the storehouse of nature for that which will cure disease. We would not limit him in this search nor in the application of principles or products thus discovered, but we do ask him to allow every other practitioner the same privilege, and cutting loose from all creeds (parchies) or exclusive dogmas, step out upon the broad platform of scientific medicine and accept the simple but honorable title of physician."

THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.—The commencement at the Agricultural college at Corvallis has been a successful one. The next year will be begun in the new building and the college will be run as an agricultural college in fact, with all modern improvements. Several new buildings are being planned, and four new professors have been hired in addition to the old faculty, all of whom are retained. One is a Yale graduate, another from Harvard, another from John Hopkins, and the other, Miss Snell, recently of California, will be professor of domestic economy, an entirely new department in the Northwest.

TWO FINE HORSES.—Delco, one of the Oneto colts, recently trotted a mile in 2:43 at Seattle, and \$1000 was afterwards offered for a half interest in him.
