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LOCAL RECORD.

OREGON.—As Albany is the center of Western Oregon, the following remarks by the celebrated Frank Pixley will be of great interest, and particularly to our Eastern readers, of which we have some in nearly every State in the Union, all interested in the State, either on account of having relatives here, or because of excited interest. "Oregon is more beautiful than California. * * * Oregon produces apples superior to any that come to our market; they are hard, crisp, luscious and juicy. There is a vast wealth of profit to the Oregon farmer if he will send us his butter and cheese, his chickens and eggs, his apples and cider, and all the lesser productions of his industry in good and cleanly condition. The average Oregon sheep, we think, better bred, larger and finer-fleeced than our California flocks. Oregon seems to supplement all that California lacks, and each State appears to the other a market in which to exchange its productions. There is no rigorous climate in Oregon, and, though its grander mountain ranges, with their loftier peaks wrapped in mantles of eternal snows, present a landscape that is most attractive, there is very little ice or snow in the lower valleys. Oregon is a country of frequent rains, and abounds rivulets, brooks and larger streams. In every part of Oregon, in the lesser and greater valleys, all are abundantly supplied with living streams of the kind that furnish constant ample power for running all kinds of mills and machinery."

BROKE HIS NECK.—Sam Kerr's threshing outfit was at work on the Millap farm near the Willamette river in the vicinity of Fairfield, says the Salem Statesman, and some trouble existed about getting a sufficient amount of water, so it was determined to procure a supply from the river.
