ALBANY TOO, Rapid Strides Being Made.

Albany is growing too. And more too. Its progress is a permanent one. There is no jump; but the gait is a healthy one. It indicates something. The eyes of the East are on us because we have the shape and location. But we are no duds. We are becoming a railroad center. The Southern Pacific traverses the city from northward and southward bound, as well as southward bound as far as Lebanon and sometime farther. The Oregon Pacific strikes us fresh from the biggest ocean, passes us fifty or sixty miles and progresses, though slowly, SURELY towards Boise City and a connection with the C & N W. The preliminary survey of the Albany and Astoria R. R. is being made the right of way is being obtained and the road will be built. These will make a pretty fair sized railroad center of us.

NEW BUILDINGS.

This is proving a healthy building year. A large number of elegant residences, of improved architecture have been constructed, noticeably those of W. S. Thompson, I. Beam, I. N. Smith, Geo. Hochstetler, John Jones, L. West, Shultz Bros., George H. Warren, W. E. Black, etc. Many more are being planned for this year. For manufacturing purposes are the large ice factory, now doing a freezing and rushing business and the Woolen Mills.
