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LOCAL RECORD.

WILL BE A WONDER.—The Salem Statesman gives an account of a trial race between J. L. C. of this city, Combination and Billy R. in which, though the Albany horse lost by a length, by breaking, it is shown that he is much the best and a remarkable young trotter. The Statesman says: Billy R. was driven by Bay Robinson, J. L. C. by Wes Shannon and Combination by John Pender. The horses were tapped off on the first trial after the preparatory work, with Billy R. at the pole, J. L. C. second and Combination third, with a comparatively good start. Combination being perhaps a half length in the rear. Billy R. gained gradually on J. L. C. until the three quarter point was reached, when Shannon could be seen to let J. L. C. have his head, and from that on he made a fine finish to the draw gate, when he broke badly, losing by about a length in 2:53, with Combination about ten or twelve lengths in the rear. This cannot, however, be taken as any mark of their speed, as neither Billy R. nor J. L. C. were urged in any manner. J. L. C. is owned by J. L. Cowan, of Albany. He was sired by Oneco, grand sire Altamont. He is four years old and has had but three months' work. Taking into consideration the fact that four years old is the off year for all horses, and that he has the staying qualities and easy action of his sire, it is but reasonable to expect him to be one of the coming wonders of Oregon.

GETTING EXCITED.—Regarding the Albany and Astoria railroad, a Mr. Falkner tells the Polk county Observer the people of that section are becoming somewhat excited. While coming out he met the surveyors just this side of the summit of the mountains, making for Dolph (the forks of the Big and Little Nestucca wagon roads.) From Dolph they will go down Three Rivers to the Big Nestucca; follow that to stream to Beaver Creek, and up that branch out into Tillamook country, to Seaside, near Astoria. Dolph is within 15 miles of the thickly settled portion of Little Nestucca.

ALBANY TOO.—The three story brick buildings which are now being completed, and which would be ornaments to any city on the coast, are being built by men who have accumulated fortunes by following business vocations in this city. THE WHEELS MOVE.

At 9:37 o'clock the wheels of a street car and the rails of a line met for the first time in Albany, in the presence of several hundred people. It promises to be the beginning of a new era in this gem city of the Valley. The move has been made and the city must now keep up with the cars. The people of Albany are proud of their new cars. Manufactured by A. J. Anslin, of this city, they are the equal if not the superior of any cars in Oregon. In matter of detail and finish they show fine workmanship. Mr. Anslin superintended their construction. The Albany Iron Works manufactured the wheels and other iron work; Mr. George Vassallo did the painting and J. F. Whiting the lettering. The cars are twelve feet inside, being half a foot longer than the Morrison Street cars in Portland. The cars have been housed for the present, and it will be several days before they will be run regularly. At 2 o'clock the magnates of the road and newspaper men were given a ride over the line of the road, much to their joy and admiration of the car, railroad track and everything concerned with the matter. The Democrat hopes to see these street cars a paying thing from the start.

A MILL BURNED.

Sunday morning about 4 o'clock the saw mill of Jennings & Co., on Hamilton Creek, eleven miles from Lebanon was discovered on fire. The main building was entirely consumed. The engine house adjoining, containing the engine and boiler, fortunately was saved, as well as the adjoining lumber, by hard work on the part of the mill men and neighbors. The fire was undoubtedly the work of an incendiary, evidence of kerosene on the timbers being very plain when the fire was discovered. The mill was only recently built and started. Another mill of Jennings & McPherson was burned at the same place in April. There was no insurance. The firm intend rebuilding.

GOOD NEWS.—It has been suspected that the Chicago & Northwestern is interested in the Oregon Pacific, says the Oregonian and now it is said to be a certainty that it has advanced \$5,000,000 to construct that road eastward from Albany. Five millions should build a road of deal road on the route from the Cascades to Boise, as the road will pass the head waters of the Deschutes, and sweep around the southern base of the Blue mountains. No greater work can be done for Oregon than the construction of the Oregon Pacific, as the whole state must feel the benefit to come from that road.

A. B. & L. A.—The exposure of the manner of transacting business by the "American Building and Loan Association" of Minneapolis, by harbor commissioner Tobin, of California is beginning to bear good fruit says an Ex. Its East Oakland branch has closed its books. The amount of stock subscribed for was in the neighborhood of \$52,000, but the loss to members, says the local manager, through the payment of assessments and initiation fees, will not amount to more than \$800. They get off easy. It is safest to deal with only home companies.

A STANDBY.—Without George Beishaw of Lane county the Oregon State fair wouldn't amount to much. The following from the Guard, will be good news to all: "I see George Beishaw, who has taken the first prize on wheat at the State fair, as well as the Centennial and other exhibitions, is now engaged in preparing an exhibit of grains for the forthcoming State fair. This will be the largest and best exhibit ever made by him. It will contain over 300 varieties of wheat, both in the sheaf and in jars and will weigh about 1500 pounds.

KILLED THREE BEARS.—Tuesday morning Morris Swank returned from the mountains and reports having killed three bears. He had shot a cub, and his dog was after another one when the old mother bear made her appearance, but only to meet her doom, as his unerring aim told of previous use of a rifle. He then killed the other cub. Judging from the claws of one of them it must have been a large one.—Brownsville Times.

EDITORIAL CORRESPONDENCE.

At eight o'clock Saturday morning the committee of citizens of Newport took charge of the members of the Press Association, putting them in carriages and going to South Beach, set out for Seal Rocks. There were 45 persons in the party, and to say that the trip was a pleasant and happy one is only drawing it mildly. The drive is ten miles down the beach, the trip being made in one and a half hours. Arriving at the Seal Rock House the party was met by mine host and hostess, Mr. and Mrs. Brasfield, original proprietors of the place. Here the view out to sea is truly and magnificently grand and splendid. The members of the party enjoyed themselves in various ways on the beach and clambering up the steep declivity of the huge black mountain-like rocks along the beach both north and south of the hotel. At noon the party sat down to a splendid repast specially provided for the party. This is one of the most delightful places around or near the Bay. At half past two o'clock the party bade adieu to the proprietors of the place, all minds being over crowded with pleasant recollections of a few hours spent at Seal Rocks. There was also some business of the association transacted, of interest only to the association. On Sunday evening the party made their way to Yaquina City, and this morning at seven o'clock entered the special car provided for the association by the obliging manager of the Oregon Pacific and came to Corvallis, where, by invitation, they stopped over to visit the Agricultural College and other points of interest in our sister city. Here the members of the association were provided with carriages to convey them to the college, and were otherwise hospitably treated by the good citizens of that place.

At three o'clock a special train brought the party into this city, all feeling that the meeting of the association had been a success.
