What is The Law?

Scio Aug 26 1889.

Editors Democrat: A great deal has been said here about the new school law, and as usual much difference of opinion exists, especially about apportioning school funds by the county superintendent. Now in my district we have some school money on hand from last year's apportionment. The new law approved Feb 21, 1889, provides that the entire school funds received annually by each school district from the apportionments from the county and state funds made by the superintendent shall be exhausted within and during the year for such apportionments were made and shall be expended for school purposes only. Now what I ask is this: Is our district compelled to spend this year the fund which it had on hands before this law was passed?

INQUIRER. (This new law applies only to funds that have been apportioned to your district since Feb 21, 1889 and not to funds that were apportioned to your district prior to that date. This is our understanding of the law.—EDITORS DEMOCRAT.)
