

A SENSIBLE ARTICLE.

When Deputy United States Marshal Neagle killed Terry, the *Oregonian* seized upon the tragic event with the hope of being able to extort some political capital from it, but so far, it has met with a deservedly ignominious defeat. Not a single republican paper, (and we cheerfully say it to their credit,) has been found in the state that would for a moment permit its columns to be used for the base and degradingly slanderous purposes to which the *Oregonian* has been from day to day lent. Many of these papers have remained silent, but the *Mountaineer*, one of the staunchest and most decent papers in the state, has the manly courage to condemn the brutal warfare which the *Oregonian* makes upon more than half the people of the Union. The *Mountaineer* says: "David S Terry—who has gone to his final account for any misdeeds of which he might have been guilty, might have been a representative of southern chivalry in ante bellum days; but no one but a narrow-minded bigot, or who has not sufficient breadth and depth of brain to grasp a question in all its details, would ever make the assertion that he was a fair representative of the democratic party. The leaders of democracy have, in some instances, descended from the old Puritan stock of Massachusetts, and are as cool and calculating a class of individuals as can be found anywhere. Cleveland, Whitney and Endicott have no hot Cavalier blood in their veins; neither did Jackson, Pierce, Buchanan or Douglas. While we acknowledge these facts, it must also be admitted that Henry Clay, the great Whig leader, was of hot, impetuous southern blood, and that John Bell, of Tennessee, the last candidate on what is denominated the Know Nothing ticket, was from the same Cavalier race. The life of Terry will not be made of any political significance except by men of very small minds, whose mental vision is obscured by prejudice, and whose ideas of men and life are contracted by extraneous influences surrounding them. The Northern democracy was composed of a different class from the southern; and the northern Whig from the southern. And to day the different portions of the United States have become so mixed that it is difficult to find a distinctive class in any. Northern Puritan and southern Cavalier have intermingled, and French Huguenot and Spanish Catholic, and these combined—although we must acknowledge the Anglo-Saxon elements to be predominant—make the modern American. Terry was undoubtedly a man whose temper held in obedience his judgment, and for making threats against a democratic justice of the U S supreme court and attempting to carry them into execution he was killed by a democratic U S deputy marshal. There can be no political significance to any event connected with this tragedy."

A good story is told of the late S L M Barlow's experience, several years ago, with some democratic friends who had gone to his summer home at Glen Cove, on Long Island, to spend a holiday with him. The party was made up of the late Governor Tilden; Charles A Dana, then as now editor of the *Sun*; Manton Marble, editor of the *World*; Smith M Weed, since become prominent in politics, and one or two other men of position. After dinner his guests made their way to the billiard-room and began to play. Before long Mr Tilden confessed to sleepiness and proposed to go to bed. Mr Barlow accompanied him, with the purpose of returning later to his pleasure seeking friends, but when he got up stairs he reached the conclusion that, as his guests knew where to sleep, he would follow Mr Barlow's example. He did so, and slept soundly until after daylight the following morning. On awakening he heard the rattle of the billiard balls, and concluded that, as his guests were such early risers, it was quite desirable that their host should get out as soon as possible. He did so, and went to the billiard room, where the game had proceeded without interruption through the whole night. He found at the door, the only exit, his faithful but fierce bull dog standing guard. The guests had made, during the night, one attempt after another to get away and go to bed; but the bull dog had done his duty so successfully as to prevent their departure, and there was nothing else to do through all the long watches of the night but to return to their cues and billiard table.

The latest report from Washington is that if the committee now investigating the pension bureau shall find that Commissioner Tanager has exceeded his authority, he will cheerfully acquiesce in the finding and be more conservative hereafter. This an exceedingly reassuring piece of news.
