THE OREGON EXHIBIT.—The DEMOCRAT has received a copy of the Milwaukee Sentinel with the following marked article, which explains itself: "The Oregon delegation, consisting of fifty-five gentlemen and ladies, arrived at 8:30 yesterday morning over the Wisconsin Central road, and their two special cars were side tracked at the old Union depot on Reed street. The Oregon people bring with them an interesting exhibit of their State's products, which will be placed in the Exposition building, and will occupy a space of 1,000 square feet. Two carloads are filled with fruit, wheat, rye, oats, barley, corn and grasses. The grain is put up in pint sacks, and will be distributed gratis at the Exposition, commencing Monday afternoon. The delegation has peaches, pears and plums in abundance, and they will be given away during Encampment week. In addition to the above 5,000 samples of wheat, oats, barley and grasses in small sheaves have been neatly arranged for the inspection of visitors. The exhibit is one of the largest ever brought to the East from the Pacific Coast, and will prove a very interesting feature of the Exposition. The delegation is headed by E. B. McElroy, commander of the Oregon department, and the exhibit is in charge of B. S. Cook."

SOLD FOR CERTAIN.—The Narrow Gauge has been sold for certain. The following despatch from London, dated Aug. 28th, to the *Examiner*, of San Francisco, explains the situation, one the people of the Valley generally will clap their hands over, for the present style of running the Narrow Gauge is a burning shame: "A meeting of the bondholders of the Oregon Railway Company was held to-day at the office of the company in Dundee, Scotland. By a unanimous vote the sale of the railroad to C. P. Huntington for \$1,000,000 was approved. The company had lost at the rate of \$200 weekly in interest and desired to consummate the sale as rapidly as possible."

HANDS UP.

A Big Robbery.

SALEM, OR., Aug. 31st.—Frank Albaugh, of near Salem, was held up last night by highway robbers and robbed of \$1,100. He had just sold his wheat at Silverton and was returning home, when, near Drift Creek two men stepped from the brush, presented their revolvers and said: "Hands up, your money or your life." He gave up. They said they had a notion to shoot him for fun and drew their revolver. Albaugh grabbed it and shot through a hand. Another shot struck his watch, glancing off. The robbers escaped.

FROM THE MINES.—Dr. Barker is down from the Santiam mines and is considerably enthused over the prospects there. Not only are the quartz mines showing up well; but something big is promised in placer mines. Several California miners have been investigating the mines with a view to bringing up several hydraulic plants, having been shut out from California on account of recent new laws, and if this is done there will be a stir there never before experienced in mining circles in Oregon. The chances are in favor of the move, and the matter will soon be decided. The plan is to run a flume from the Meadows, a distance of ten miles and then do some placer mining on a big scale. This would take \$100,000 before any mining was done. Visions of ten or fifteen thousand miners and a Leadville are already appearing.
