OUR COMPLIMENTS.

It is very consoling to the editors of Oregon, outside the Oregonian office, that Harvey Scott cannot make or unmake their "mental calibre," his inflated egotism to the contrary notwithstanding. Without exception, almost, he has at different times denominated them "ignorant asses," "fools," "men of small mental calibre," etc., but nevertheless they have pursued their different careers unmindful of the adverse criticism. If the great daily were not backed by capital, the result of the sagacity of the business manager—not of the editor—it is a question whether it would amount to any greater consideration than very many of the little papers upon which it vents its spleen and malignity. In viewing the course of the Oregonian, since its columns have been controlled by the present editor, it has been "all things to all men." On the tariff question it has advocated free trade and protection, and at one time favored the mugwumps and another the stalwarts. It has blown hot and cold on the same subjects, and has stultified itself in a hundred ways. On the forfeiture of the Wallula land grant and opening the Columbia river it has been most chameleon-like, at one time saying the grant was necessary for the completion of the Northern Pacific and at another that the grant should be forfeited; time and again it has told the people of Eastern Oregon the railroad was all they needed for transportation, and shifted around and advocated the opening of the Columbia river. Warmed into editorial life in the bosom of Ben Holladay, editor Scott has always been the subservient tool of railroad corporations. He lauded Henry Villard to the skies when he entered Oregon on the completion of the N. P., and was the first to give him a cowardly kick when he was "downed" in Wall street. He has praised and abused all races and sects just as his Pecksniffian ideas seemed to dictate. The interests of Portland he has ruthlessly wrecked on every occasion, and there is not another paper in that city that has not exhibited more sagacity and business sense than the Oregonian. It will take too much space to point out facts to prove further that the Oregonian has been dishonest and time serving in almost every position it has taken on public questions, whether moral, religious or political, and that it has never led sentiment in a single instance; but the reading public knows the truth of these assertions. It has been the plutocrat of plutocrats, the defender and friend of monopolists. Denude it of its monopoly of dispatches, and it is as bare a skeleton of a journal as is published anywhere. In every argument had with other papers it has never replied manfully or with the spirit of journalistic courtesy; but with the instinct of the reptile and brute uppermost when cornered, it has fought back skunk-fashion.—*Mountainier.*
