LOCAL RECORD.

RUN BY CLERGYMEN.—Last Sunday's Register says: "The management of the new Indian school is generally assuming a clerical aspect. General Middle some time ago was removed to make room for Rev. Mr. Irwin, of Albany, present superintendent. Mr. Irwin, in place of Mr. Morris, the clerk, who was as able and efficient an official as ever held that place, with Rev. Royal, a clergyman of Salem; and the old superintendent of the farming department has been relieved to make room for Mr. McNamee, who is also said to be, or to have been, a spiritual adviser. More changes are yet to be made. Appearances would indicate that the institution of spiritual truths to the minds of the untutored sons of the forest is to be given more prominence than the more common trades and practical knowledge."

ACCEPTED.—The County Judge and commissioners returned last evening from Dayton, where they met the Marion County Commissioners and examined and accepted the new bridge there, just built at a cost of \$18,500, to be paid for jointly by the two counties. The bridge is nearly two feet higher than the contract called for. The approaches are not yet completed and will be several days before they are completed. Stayton people build their bridge; but Linn county foots the bill for work on this end.

A BRIDGE COLLAPSED.—Yesterday afternoon a farmer with a heavy load of heat was coming across the bridge just west of the residence of Mr. Hub Bryant, when the structure gave way and the wagon went down into the depths below, a distance of eight or ten feet. Some of the wheat was spilled; but the wagon was taken out without much damage, and the man went on his way. As the bridge is the present city limits this will offer another job for the city council, and will take the city's pocket book thinner yet.
