

LOCAL RECORD.

A HORSE EXCITEMENT.—A bubble of excitement was caused this morning when Johnny Schmeers' stallion got loose and ran helter skelter through our thronged streets. A team standing in front of P. LOSS SOLD.—Yesterday near Crawfordsville Geo Humphrey sold on an execution obtained at the last Circuit court against the estate of Samuel Althouse, between two and three million feet of logs, Mr J M Moyer being the highest bidder, the figures being \$3650.
