Encouraging quarterly reports were read by the officers and superintendents of the Albany W. C. T. U. at their meeting on Tuesday, the 15th. The President spoke hopefully of the prospects for the winter's work, for which the exercises and suggestions of the recent District Convention had been a helpful preparation. She regretted that more of the members had not been present to share in the instruction and inspiration to be gained from our state and national officers, who were present. She also expressed her sense of the need of more than human power to dislodge the mighty foe—the drink and drink traffic, so strongly entrenched behind the State and National government. Superintendent of Juvenile work announced that arrangements were in progress for resuming work in this department, and that the Loyal Legion would probably be re-opened on Friday, Oct. 25th. Superintendent of Parlor meetings stated that these meetings would be resumed on Wednesday, Nov. 6th. Rent committee announced the entire cost of building the kitchen to be \$51. An excellent plan for making meetings more interesting was read and on motion adopted. Members and visitors, either ladies or gentlemen, who are always welcome at all meetings, will thus have an opportunity of becoming better acquainted with the object and methods of the various departments of W. C. T. U. work.

Moral suasion and moral effort, however, can never have much more than a few individual triumphs here and there, so long as the strong arm of the state is thrown around the liquor traffic, and it is legalized and sanctioned and protected by statutes and government officers.
