ON TO THE FRONT.—Messrs. Ormond, Crook & Co., the new contractors, left this morning on the 8:30 train for the front with their plant and about thirty men. They will work a limited number of men this winter, as weather permits, but it is understood will not put a full force on until spring. Their plant consists of two car loads of mules, brought from Colorado in good shape, and five car loads of working and cooking utensils and provisions. Their contract begins eighteen miles beyond Breitenbush. Grading has now been done to within a short distance this side of Breitenbush's; but rails have been laid to only three miles this side of that place. Antonelle & Doe are pushing the intervening space forward as fast as possible with the number of men employed. Next spring a big move will be made East and a large number of men be put to work, but the indications are that during the winter only a limited movement ahead will be made. Ormond, Crook & Co., are said to be men of wealth and push, and have had an experience that qualifies them for the work in hand.

A year from now we expect to be able to ride into Crook county. We remember when the road was positively to be completed to Boise City in the fall of 1889. That is now. This simply goes to show that railroad building is necessarily slow, and even for booming purposes there is nothing in a continual prediction of several times as speedy work as experience shows to be probable. It is enough that we are slowly but surely getting there, and will soon become a point on a great transcontinental line, several hundred miles shorter than any other.

"WHAT'S IN A NAME?"—The Walla Walla Journal thinks there is a whole lot in a name. Speaking of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, he says: "It's a splendid paper, but the long handle to its name will forever mitigate against it. It always does.
