AS TO "GHOULS."

Scott of the *Oregonian* writes, frets and worries because the democratic press of the state has stigmatized him as a "ghoul." This is done because Scott, actuated solely by a spirit of hate, unparalleled in the history of Oregon journalism, rushes fourth on the occasion of the death of any leading democrat, and is first at the side of the grave of such democrat, even before the clods of the valley are heard to rattle on the coffin, and there, with demonic chuckling, heaps upon the deceased, the bitterest vituperation, slander and abuse, that can fall from the lips of a human ghoul. This characterization of Scott is the hard, frozen truth. Every reader of the *Oregonian* knows the charge is literally true. It is no fault of the democratic press of the state that Scott knows no motive, when speaking of democrats, except the motive of bitter, partizan hate. Democrats would fain speak of him in better terms, but his open outlawry against decent, respectable journalism precludes them from doing so. Happily, and to the credit of the republican press of the state, Scott stands solitary and alone in his attitude of bitter, unrelenting hate towards all democrats. He has recently opened up his vile weapons of slander and pours their poisonous contents upon the bright clean imperishable reputation of Sunset Cox with a zeal that indicates that the "ghoulish editor" really thinks that he can tarnish such a reputation. But wherever he is known, all his vilest vaporings will fall far short of tarnishing the reputation of any clean man, however obscure. He vilifies Cox as unpatriotic because that gentleman proposed in congress during the war to create a peace commission composed of such men as Millard Fillmore, Reverdy Johnson, Thomas Ewing, Edward Everett and others, to settle all difficulties leading to the war. Nothing was to be done inconsistent with the integrity of the union. Cox believed that the whole matter could be settled, thousands of precious lives and untold millions of treasure saved, and the integrity of the union permanently fixed and established by means of a commission, and, inspired by his broad unselfish patriotism, he proposed a bill to that effect. For this display of patriotism whose superior quality is beyond Scott's comprehension, he is denounced by the *Oregonian* substantially as a traitor. Is it any wonder that Scott is regarded as ghoulish by not only democrats but by scores of republicans all over the state? We are told that Cox voted against the bill approving and legalizing all the acts, proclamations and orders of President Lincoln after March 4th 1861 respecting the calling out of volunteers before the assembling of congress, and this is charged against Cox as inhuman and unpatriotic. If the president had violated the constitution and laws, it was no discredit to a man who had sworn to support them that he could not conscientiously vote to approve and legalize such violations. In the eyes of all broad minded people it was an act of the broadest fealty to his country and its institutions. Scott complains that Cox, in 1862, voted against compensated or any other emancipation. Well, there were scores of republicans all over the country and in congress at that time who opposed all forms of emancipation. The democrat that opposed it is denounced as a traitor, and the republican that opposed it is hailed as a very loyal man. Such is the inconsistency of the *Oregonian*. Does any one suppose, that, if Judge Deady should pass that bourn whence no traveler returns? Scott would take the chief place of conspicuity at his grave and there in unmeasured terms denounce Deady as a traitor for voting to establish slavery in Oregon? Does Scott, when any one of the numerous confederate brigadiers who, since the war have identified themselves with the republican party, dies denounce him as a traitor? No he passes off to the grave with the richest encomiums of this man Scott. So it will be seen, and it is so understood by all observant people, that this ghoulish attack upon Mr. Cox is because he was a faithful, exemplary and worthy democrat, and not because of his record.

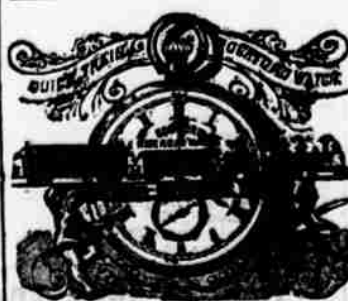
