GETTING TIRED.—The following from the Eugene Register is a sample of the way the booms in Military companies often terminate, though it is quite different from the experience in Albany, where considerable interest is taken even to this day: "We get it from good authority that the militia company in this city will disband about the first of next April, at which time most of the members will have served their three years.
