THE EDUCATIONAL CAMPAIGN.

Congressman Roger Q Mills has arrived at Washington for the winter. He looks rosy and robust, although not entirely recovered yet from the effect of the very hard work he performed last year in the preparation of his tariff bill and afterwards in championing it in the campaign. He is still slightly troubled with vertigo and insomnia. Speaking to *The World* correspondent to-day Mr Mills said: "The tariff is still the issue and must remain uppermost until it has been revised in the interests of the people. No, the passage of a tariff bill by this approaching Congress will not eliminate the issue from National politics, nor even subordinate it, for whatever bill is passed will be framed by the influence of the manufacturer for his own benefit, and not the cheapening of products for the masses. I expect to see substantially the main features of the Senate Tariff bill become a law, and at that the republicans will want to stop. But we shall not permit them to stop there. A much longer step in the direction of lower duties must be taken."

"Is what is known as the educational tariff campaign making satisfactory progress?"

"My advice on that subject make me more than contented. The movement in Pennsylvania with Black at his head is conspicuously a success. The movement is to be made national, but our hope of recruits lies for the present in the manufacturing rather than in the agricultural sections. The man whose daily bread is at stake will give you closer and more sympathetic attention when you attempt to explain the workings of the tariff than the farmer who feels the pinch of no actual poverty. The light is breaking fast on the wage-earners in the manufacturing States. The gains we made last year in the manufacturing centres of Massachusetts, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Connecticut and New York will be doubled in 1892."

"What is the progress in Pennsylvania?"

"It is more assuring there than elsewhere. Mr Randall's political power at home is completely broken. While he has many warm personal friends, who are attached to him because of his strong and estimable personal character, he is no longer a leader of Democratic thought in Pennsylvania. The democrats of that state are as earnestly for tariff reform as are the democrats of Texas."

Being asked about Cleveland and Hill Mr Mills replied: "The South is arriving at a more just estimate of Gov. Hill, and especially with regard to his part in the last campaign. Mr Cleveland's popularity, which is very great, springs out of the fact that the people regard him as an honest and courageous man, who sacrificed himself to all the more securely establish the principle of a low tariff and renew the democratic party's allegiance to it. However, speculation about 1892 is at this time of very small consequence. Only this much is certain, that Gov. Hill will not suffer them in the south because of any old charge that he was not loyal to the fortunes of the National Democracy in the campaign of last year. The men who credit that charge, living in the South to-day, are very few."

THE DUTY ON CARPET WOOLS.

The *American Wool Reporter*, although opposed to free carpet wool and claiming that free raw materials of this kind would not benefit the wool trade, makes this significant admission:

A removal of the duty on carpet wool would probably cause a reduction in the price of carpets to the extent of at least a portion of the duty now paid.

Suppose, for the purposes of the case, that the *Reporter* is correct and the admission of carpet wool free of duty would not so much benefit the trade in carpet wool, what shall be said of the second proposition? Is it not the duty of congress, in a case where it is not claimed that the trade will be injured, to legislate for the consumer? Should not the men and women who buy carpets come into the calculation at all? No one claims that the duty on carpet wool is protective, because very little of that kind of wool is produced in this country. It is produced, according to the testimony of the woolen manufacturers, in a semi-barbarous country. The duty upon it does not benefit the carpet manufacturers since they get no benefit from a tax that they add to their goods. It does not aid our wool growers, for they are not in competition with that kind of product. But it does injure every man and every person that has occasion to buy a yard of carpeting, and takes from his or her pocket a sum of money in taxes that aids no industry and is not needed by the government. Why, then, should such a tax remain? How better could the surplus revenue be reduced?

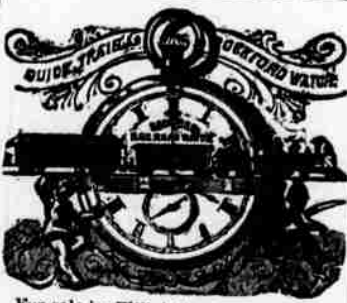
