LOCAL RECORD

NINE PERSONS DROWNED.

A Frightful Accident at Yaquina Bay.
News has been received here of one of the most frightful drowning accidents in the history of the Northwest, at Yaquina Bay yesterday. A man by the name of Wagner who had taken up a claim on the south side of the Bay took his wife and seven children into a small boat to cross over to Olsen's. His brother-in-law whose name was Parker went along to take the boat back to the south side. When they arrived near Olsen's the boat was capsized throwing all out into the bay. The mother, seven children and brother-in-law were all drowned, the father alone being saved. The awful accident has cast a gloom of sorrow over the whole community. Seven of the bodies have been recovered, being all but the man and youngest child.

COURT COURT.

The case of the State against Bert Rolfe was given to the jury last evening. After being out about half an hour a verdict of not guilty was brought in and the boy was discharged. As the case of his brother, Fred was the same, he was also on motion of the District Attorney, discharged. As the confessions of Hill and Rolfe were ruled out by the Court there was nothing but circumstances on which to work, and they proved insufficient in the minds of the jury. The result is that Hill will pay the penalty for the three by spending ten years in the penitentiary, that being the sentence imposed on him by Judge Boise. The justice of Lex are sometimes peculiar and Justice through technicalities drops the balance. In the meantime the bodies of Jack Miller and Quint Guthrie are lying in untimely graves, without any doubt in the mind of the public, through the criminality of these three young men.

The reading of the testimony in the Workman divorce case took the attention of the court for a long time. The suit was brought by W. T. Workman, who returned Stott Bros. of Portland, while the defendant, a daughter of Mr. W. W. Parrish, of Sodaville, retained C. E. Wolverton of this city. The testimony was taken before Judge Powell and it is said contained a few savory items of a sensational nature.
