Petition of Peter Riley and others, asking that all cess pools be prohibited and all cesses not connected with sewers be rearranged so as to be readily cleaned, was read and referred to committee on health and police.

On motion city Recorder was directed to give proper notice of city election to be held on first Monday in December.

The following Judges and Clerks of election were selected for such election: First Ward—Martin Payne, D Froman and W O Reed, judges; C W Watts, T J Stiles, clerks.

Second Ward—Ellis Knox, L Senders and Strader Froman, judges; C G Rawlings and J R Wyatt, clerks.

Third Ward—G F Simpson and F A Burkhardt, judges; John Isom, Wm Huston and A A Parker, clerks.

A cross walk was ordered at east end of Third street along Maine.

Several sidewalk improvements were ordered.

The city contractor for hauling dirt was directed to take dirt from square at Washington and Second street and move to other squares.

Councilman Burkhardt moved that work of grading Washington and Second streets be under the supervision of Street Commissioner and Committee on streets and public property, property owners falling to do anything the commissioner to proceed to remove dirt as it comes.
