COAL FIND.—For some time past Dr Taylor has had a man at work on Lynch's farm, a couple of miles south Eugene, prospecting for coal. The coal struck was in small quantities, indications pointed to larger veins. A few days ago at a depth of not to exceed feet the man struck a vein of fine coal bed thick and from 15 to 20 feet wide, there are two qualities of coal in the vein, the kind being first-class fuel coal and the other equal to the best quality of coal used by the blacksmiths. Those who are familiar with coal fields state that this is a very remarkable increase in the size of the vein. Veins were discovered at the base of hills and extend into the hill.—Eugene Register.

And here is another one: "Collet Bill" tells us of the discovery of a vein of coal in the mountains some six or seven miles west of the Ochoco gold mines. He and his brother were hunting for coal last week, they accidentally discovered traces of coal where a tree had been rooted, and upon prospecting discovered three-inch vein of the product.—Princeton News.

A FORMER LINN CO. MAN IN IT.—The case of B J Pengra vs A Wheeler occupied the attention of the circuit court on Tuesday morning until Saturday afternoon last week. Pengra owns the water power at Springfield and Wheeler owns the mill and has the water power rented at \$1000 per year. He held back part of the rent, claiming that sufficient power was not furnished, and Pengra brought suit to recover the balance of the rent. Wheeler in turn claimed damages and the jury brought in a verdict in his favor for \$225. —Eugene Register.
