An idea of the large amount of freight business done at Albany may be gathered from the fact that during the last six months over 3200 way bills were made out at the Southern Pacific office in this city. This is over double the number made out at any other office between Portland and California, the nearest being 1400 way bills at one office. Besides this it is well to consider the large number made out at the O. R. & N. and O. P. offices, in order to get a better idea of the importance of the city as a shipping point. The number made out for local trade alone was large, indicating a big business in Albany, and with the rest, divulges the fact that already a nice wholesale trade is done by the merchants of this city. These are the things that speak for a city. While we are working up a boom it is well to keep on the importance of establishing the reputation of Albany as a trade center, and the figures easily do this.

TEMPERANCE COLUMN.

Edited by Albany W. C. T. U.

Mrs. Flora Ellice Stevens, of Chama, New Mexico, who has lately been appointed territorial press superintendent for the W. C. T. U., conducts the only department in any newspaper in the territory devoted to the interest of women. She has edited such a department in the Los Vegas Optic for three years with great success.

The campaign for prohibition in Nebraska is just opening. Representatives from this state and from Kansas, Iowa and the Dakotas are expected to meet in Omaha in January to arrange for an inter-state league that shall concentrate its effort on Nebraska until the question is decided.

The "Newberry bill" went into effect in Missouri Nov. 1. Its avowed object is to reduce the attractions offered by saloons, especially to the young. In substance it prohibits dice, cards, pool tables, billiard tables and bowling alleys, pinos, banjos and other musical instruments in saloons where liquor is sold. Chairs and tables are also forbidden, and singing in a saloon is likewise made a misdemeanor as well as all games for drinks or money. Sparring and wrestling are prohibited, and upon conviction of any violation, the license may be revoked and the saloon closed.

The Central (New York conference) (Methodist) declares that if slavery could be called the sum of all villainies the liquor traffic may justly be called the multiplication of all villainies; and further affirms: "We have no interest in its regulation; why should we? As well contemplate the regulation of murder, arson and theft as the regulation of that which produces all these crimes and more."

A celebrated orator in speaking of Sacramento, says: "The last thing you pass by as you enter the cemetery gate, and only sixty feet from it, is a saloon. The first thing which confronts a mother after laying away her boy, a victim of the liquor traffic, as she passes out at the gate, is the legalized business that destroyed him. Inside the cemetery are places set apart for the burial of Odd Fellows, Masons and members of the Improved Order of Red Men. It seemed to me that what was most needed in wine-cursed California was an improved order of white men."

The Illinois W. C. T. U. convention, among other generous appropriations for the year, voted \$350 to the evangelistic department of work.

From reports of the recent National W. C. T. U. convention at Chicago we glean the following: Miss Willard has donated to the National W. C. T. U. \$2000, balance due her from the sale of her book, "Glimpses of Fifty Years." This is one of the largest gifts ever tendered the organization.

Mrs. Mary H. Hunt, speaking upon "Temperance Work in the Colleges," said that her department was about to address a letter to the faculties and presidents of the American colleges, asking them to forbid the drinking of wine and liquors at class banquets and college suppers.

During the evening session Nov. 15th occurred the national oratorical contest for the first diamond medal offered in the Democrat series of prizes. There were seven contestants and the winner was Miss Daisy Stoddart, a 11 year old girl from Nebraska. She delivered a prohibition address, entitled "Liquor and Outrage," and was awarded the prize at a great applause.
