The following is from the Salem Statesman, and contains some snuff and evidently pinches our sister city; but the article, to tell the truth, is not without its merit and at least shows how the outside world looks at the big ad. Altogether it is a very unfortunate affair, and the Oregonian at least deserves a big kick, and really it pays to tell the truth in the long run: "An Albany real estate firm advertises in the Oregonian that the Albany & Astoria railroad is now in course of construction; that Albany has a street railway 'system'; the most complete electric light works in the state, its dynamo furnishing more lights than 'all the other cities of the valley combined'; that the 'largest and best woolen mills in the state are being built'; and that she gets her water supply direct from the Cascade mountains. Not one of these statements is true. The Salem electric light works are sufficient to supply a half dozen such towns as Albany. Such advertising does not help any place. It hurts. To tell the truth about Albany would show that she is a progressive and enterprising city, possessing many advantages; but to give out to the world that she has what she has not does much more harm than good to her."
