The Portland Journal, republican says: "If the administration at Washington, and particularly the Oregon delegation, do not wish to be relegated to 'innocuous desuetude' so far as Oregon is concerned, they should lay the cold blade of the political scalping knife on the heads of the democratic appointees who now hold the fat offices in the federal service of this state. No man was ever more brazenly 'an obnoxious partisan' than Marshal Myers, and the other federal officials are none the less deserving of a speedy ticket of leave. If it is a good and wise thing to elect republican congressmen and senators, it must be equally the part of wisdom to appoint republicans to all the important offices. Let the good work begin." This is the actual spirit of republican civil service reform referred to by the republicans in their national platform.

The Portland Journal says: "Candidate Foraker's dispatch to governor Semple elect, congratulating the latter upon his success is another mark of a true republican, and only tends to show the difference between the selected material it takes to make a republican and the stuff democrats are made of. Who ever heard of a democrat sending a congratulating dispatch to a successful republican? That would be as contrary to the general make up of the ordinary democrat, as a monkey climbing a tree backwards. Neither are built that way." Now does the Journal really suppose that Foraker was glad that Campbell, (not Semple) was elected? If so, why did he use all the power he could summon including a base resort to forged papers to defeat him. For three months Foraker put forth super-human efforts to defeat Campbell and then after all these efforts have failed and Campbell elected he rushes in to congratulate the latter. No Foraker was not glad. His congratulation to Campbell was the well known effort of the demagogue to secure a little cheap capital.

The Philadelphia Telegraph, a leading republican paper of that state has its views of the late election. It says: The present administration has been in existence since the 4th day of March last, and it is but, the shortest truth, known of all men, that it has not up to this day done a single thing—or for the matter of that, said a single thing—to indicate that it has any idea or policy unconnected with the distribution of federal offices. It might have adopted a policy in regard to that public duty which would have commended it to the earnest support of the country; but it chose to adopt one which has day by day brought down upon it the angry condemnation of the country. The president had apparently no other and higher idea of the duties of his great office when he entered it, or since, than that of distributing the executive patronage. To that single line of duty he has devoted himself with an energy and pertinacity unexampled.

Never before in the history of the country has public office, which should be a public trust, been so persistently used as a political spoil, or as a reward to the practical politician, as has been the case since the 4th of March.

The country has no cause to regret the result of Tuesday's election, nor will the republican party have if its able and honest managers insist that the administration shall call a halt upon the policy of vulgar, selfish politics which it has pursued since its coming into power. The rebuke of the people on Tuesday was emphatic; and unless the administration changes its entire course and shows that it has higher aims than those of putting the offices where they will do most good to one man, the rebuke of 1893 will be a great deal more emphatic.

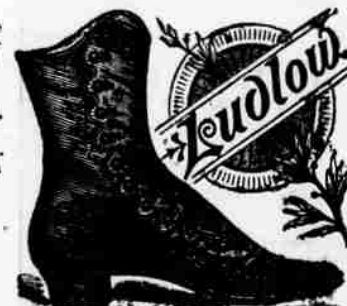
