GETTING EVEN.—The Democrat has received a copy of the Five and Hammer, published by the notorious W T Ellis, now of Eugene. As we assisted in stirring up the loud-mouthed fellow we give a couple of squibs about Brownsville and Albany to show what a venomous fellow Ellis is: Brownsville, Oregon, is the most essentially wicked, lawless masked hoodlum town of about three hundred and fifty people we ever saw. It has five church buildings and seven different kinds of Christians; and there are not seven straight Christians to stand for God and right, and against sin, in a radius of five miles. Albany, the county seat of Linn county, mobbed out the Salvation Army with mud, tobacco quids and stones. Hoodlum gangs infest its streets, and are encouraged and tolerated like jackal dogs. The trouble arose over a quarrel with his brother, one of them owning some land and the other a house on it, a fight arising about the occupancy in which divers weapons were used, but no one was hurt. Finally one charged the other with stealing \$20 in money, had him arrested and taken before a justice, who held him to await the action of the grand jury. This is a poor way for brothers to treat each other.
