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LOCAL RECORD.

SEVERAL TRANSACTIONS.—Mr. Peebler, who recently moved to Albany from Umatilla county, has bought of J. H. Burkhardt, 35 acres of the Settlement farm, 2 1/2 miles from the city paying \$3350 for the same, or \$90 an acre.

Mr. Perry Spinks has sold to Mr. Fred Blumberg three lots at the corner of Fifth and Maple Streets, including the woodshed, and also wood in the same and team. Consideration private. Mr. Blumberg will hereafter run the wood business.

Mr. Spinks has also sold to Dr. D. M. Jones two lots at the corner of Ferry and Water Streets, for \$2600, and also the lumber on the property, and Dr. Jones will run the yard.

TO ASTORIA.—W. B. Barr and Capt. E. J. Lanning are in Astoria in the interest of the Albany & Astoria R. R. Barr will go over the route to Tillamook, but will not make the survey at present. He is reported to have said: "In regard to how soon the work will begin, I cannot state. I know, however, the company means business. They have plenty of money, but I hardly think that building will commence much before spring. That the Albany & Astoria will connect the two cities inside of a year, I have no doubt."

STATE FAIR BOARD.—The following are the officers who will run the State fair next year, having just been elected, mostly re-elected. President, D. H. Looney; vice-president, William Galloway; secretary, J. T. Gregg; treasurer, A. Bush; chief marshal, John Q. Wilson; superintendent of the pavilion, E. M. White. The executive committee consists of D. H. Looney, chairman, John Wilson, M. Wilkins, Wm. Galloway, J. T. Apperson, and the finance committee of D. S. Buick, John G. Wright and V. B. DeLashmutt. J. Q. Wilson superintendent of grounds.

A GOOD SELL.—Yesterday afternoon Mr. J. J. Graham sold to Jas. V. Pipe 66 feet, or one lot, front of his property at the corner of First and Baker streets, for \$6600. Mr. Graham has two lots left. For the three lots he paid Mr. C. C. Cherry last January \$5350, and some thought the price was high. That is the way Albany is pushing ahead.

BIG DAMAGE SUITS.—Thirty suits have been brought in Polk county against the Narrow Gauge Railroad company for damages on the account of wheat burned during the past summer. The amounts asked for will aggregate about \$50,000. The suits will be hotly contested.

ALL RAISED.—The Lebanon paper mill subscription was raised last evening, subscriptions for the entire \$5000 being on paper. This shows that Lebanon has some enterprise of a high order too. This mill will be a benefit to the whole county and can depend on Albany's support.

THE MAN ABOUT TOWN.

The Man About Town sees one pleasant feature about the present interesting era and that is that through this glorious valley all the towns are growing thrivingly. Naturally though there is a contest for the supremacy, and as has universally been the case some feeling arises, not of a very serious nature though. At present Albany and Salem are doing a little the most dancing, and are watching each other very closely even down to the size of their freight bills, to say nothing of electric light plants. The truth is, that outside of the two places Albany is getting the credit of pushing ahead the fastest, and as a business city already outstripping its northern neighbor. And one man who has investigated the electric light business finds that Albany's splendid system has a total of 152,850 candle power, while Salem's foots up at 129,620, Eugene's at 13,800 and Corvallis at 8,000, the total for the three being 150,800 candle power, less than Albany's. While Albany's streets are lighted by 2000 candle arc lights, Salem's are lighted by 1000 or 1200 candle power lights. All these things help to make matters lively.

The great strife very naturally incites exaggeration and inflated figures on population, building, etc., are generally given everywhere. They may help booms, but experience shows that they tend to bubbles which burst. With our splendid backing here, though, there is little chance of the fate of Los Angeles, Wichita and many other places; besides first we have to pass Seattle, Spokane and such places, whereas now we are only getting a good start.

Speaking of watching each other it is interesting to notice how it is done from cities, by business men, and even by foot racers. Just previous to the time for the foot race between Cameron and Trine, that didn't terminate, the M. A. 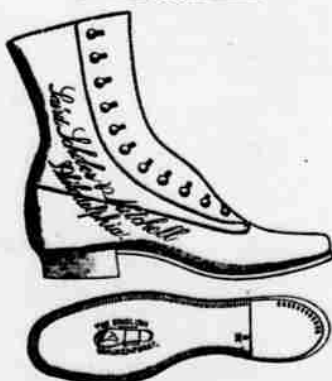
