AN ARTFUL DODGER.

There is no policy of administration to defend which, requires so skilled an artful dodger as does the policy of protection—a scheme to tax the many for the benefit of the few. The other day we called attention to the remarkable admission made by the *Oregonian* on the subject of the tariff, the leading and most significant one made by that paper being this: "Under the operation of the protective tariff, which was invented for the benefit of the Eastern manufacturer and which forbade resort to cheaper markets abroad, the western consumer was obliged to pay tribute to a system of production which violated economic principles by carrying goods twice over a needless journey with the cost of the double transit." The *Oregonian* makes an attempt to reply to our article but in the most artful manner dodges our criticism on this remarkable admission which absolutely gives away the whole theory of protection. The truth of the *Oregonian's* statement no one can disprove, and few candid men will deny. We are glad that the *Oregonian*, in an ungarded moment, has admitted the truth that "the tariff was invented for the benefit of the eastern manufacturer." In its attempt to reply to our article it studiously avoids any reference to this fatal admission but wanders off and indulges in a lot of non sense and falsehood about Mills and his bill. But that paper will not be allowed to escape in that way. The tariff was invented for the benefit of Eastern manufacturers and not for the benefit of labor people, farmers, and consumers as was blatantly claimed by the *Oregonian* and all the other protection organs last fall. The truth is that the profit of one must be the loss of another, and hence this protection scheme that results in profit to eastern manufacturers must result in a burden to those who pay these profits. No body short of a fool could fail to see that labor people and other non-protected classes are made to bear these burdens for the benefit of these protected manufacturers. From this conclusion there is no escape.

A SAVING RESUME.

Some time ago, Wanamaker, Postmaster General, voluntarily pledged himself to Senator Wade Hampton of South Carolina that the democratic postmaster at Columbia in that state should be permitted to serve his term out and that no appointment would be made, even at the expiration of the term without first consulting the Senator. The other day while the Senator was absent from his state Wanamaker removed the democratic postmaster and appointed his successor. As soon as Hampton heard of it he wrote Wanamaker a scathing letter in which, among other things he said: The newspapers state that besides managing the great department over which you preside, you are running a Sunday-school in Philadelphia, and it occurs to me that you might with profit to yourself select as the most appropriate subject of a lecture to your pupils the instructive story of "Ananias and Sapphira." This would give you a fine field for your eloquence in explaining to your young charges the importance of confining themselves to the truth—except when some fancied advantage might be obtained over a political opponent.
