HIGH PRICES.—Several days ago a couple Italians came from the front on account of being ill. While getting shaved, at Jim Brody's at First and Lyon street, that barber offered to prescribe for them and take his pay when they got their money on their time checks. The price was \$2 a piece. They took his medicine. Last night they went in and paid Brody \$4; when he, according to their story, demanded \$5 a piece more, which they paid. Then they squealed and called in Marshal Hoffman and Nightwatch Miller, when the money was refunded. Brody states that the report circulated that he threatened to kill them if the money was not paid is untrue, and that it can be verified by a man who was in his shop at the time. The incident at least shows that Mr Brody is high priced and that he received pay contrary to law for doing what we have duly admitted physicians for doing.

FIGURES.—It is easy to figure out anything in this world, and we have about come to the conclusion that figures don't always tell the truth. The Salem Statesman says: "Salem is modest, but she gets there" when it comes to figuring up the capacity of her electric light works. She has an arc capacity of 96 lights of 2000 candle power each (292,000 candles) and an incandescent capacity of 1070 lamps of 45 candle power each (48,150 candles), and 500 incandescent lights of sixteen candle power each (8,000 candles), making a total of 248,150 candles, almost twice that of the windy city up the creek. Figures don't lie. Albany claim was 152,850 candle power.
