HISTORY REPEATING ITSELF.

The Philadelphia Times, which for years has been the organ of Sam Randall has this to say about the late elections: "The issue that is repeating the revolutionary work of the slavery issue of 1854 is the now vital question of tariff reform. It had many pretexts in shape of 'local issues' to open the way for party revolt; but if there had not been profound unrest in New England, in the Middle States and the great West because of aggressive and needless taxation upon the necessities of life, and of the open prostitution of the policy of protection to monopoly greed, no 'local issues' could have defeated a republican Governor and Legislature in Ohio, defeated a republican Governor in Iowa, and elected democratic State tickets in New York, New Jersey and Virginia by majorities which equally surprised the leaders of all parties. And the revolt of 1889, like the revolt of 1854, will grow in power and become more and more revolutionary in every section of the Union, until needless taxation of the people shall be overthrown, and banded monopoly shall cease to have special protection at the cost of consumers.

The people of this country believe in the liberal protection of American labor. It was first thought by Washington, and has been sustained by every President from Washington to Harrison; and it never will be overthrown in the nation unless protectionist leaders engulf their cause and themselves in the exacting greed of monopoly. Massachusetts and Iowa will heartily protect the wages of labor in our tariff laws, but tariff taxes employed for protection must cease with protection to wages. With our manufacturers put upon equality with their competitors abroad on the question of wages, every dollar of additional tax imposed is simply inexcusable oppression of the people. Iowa and Massachusetts want cheapened American products without reducing wages of labor; they want free coal, free wool, free iron ore and free scrap iron to enable the New England industries to live, and the farmers of Iowa, with their crushing tariff taxes on everything they use, eat and wear, and growing mortgages on their farms, want cheapened clothing, implements and household effects. And they not only want them, but they must have them; and the recent elections simply emphasize the purpose of both East and West to have honest and thorough tariff revision and reduced taxes or revolution. It is only history repeating itself, and whether it shall be a brief rebellion or a sweeping revolution, will depend upon the leaders of the party in power. The democratic leaders in 1854 learned nothing, forgot nothing, and were hopelessly overthrown; what will the republican leaders of 1889 do? History is repeating itself.

Chicago has voted practically unanimously in favor of the great ship canal project to connect Lake Michigan with the Mississippi River, and thus make a through route to the Gulf of Mexico. It is expected that the canal will be fifteen years in building, and its purpose is sanitary as well as commercial, the canal having a flow of water making it at all times free of offensiveness to the populous district through which it passes. There will be on its line several locks, where considerable surplus power may be used for manufacturing purposes. Chicago is a great city, and this canal will add to its importance. More products of the South will come North for transportation through the great lakes than will go in the contrary direction.
