A BREEDER OF TROTTERS.—The following from the North Pacific Rural Spirit and Willamette Farmer has been handed us for publication:

The trotting bred brood mare, Belle Price, owned by Jay Beach, Vancouver, Wash., is one of the kind that it pays to keep. She has had five colts sired by Altamont, and they were sold by Mr Beach for a total of \$4200, but three times that sum will not now purchase them.

Zilophone, record 2:35, trial 2:30, was her first colt, and at 3 years of age was sold to Col W S Stone, of Yreka, Cal, for \$1000; Oneco, record, 2:29 1/2, sold to McKnight Bros., Albany, Or., at 2 years of age for \$600; Pricemont, 3 year old record 2:35, public exhibition at 4 of 2:27 1/2, was sold when 6 weeks old to John E Smith, Hillsboro, Or., for \$6000; Barrows Bros., of Shedd, Or., purchased Multineah as a yearling, paying \$1000, and Multineah was recently sold to Jerome B Smith, of Vancouver, Wash., at the same age for \$1000. Multineah and Multineah have not yet been trained, but competent judges who have seen them agree that they are fast, fine gaited trotters, and will be heard from in the records.

Mr Beach purchased Belle Price when a yearling of the late Gen W T Witheiss, Fairview Stock Farm, Lexington, Ky. She was sired by Doble, that was the fastest 2 year old of his day, his record of 2:40 1/2 standing at the head of all 2 year old records for five years. He gained a record of 2:28 at 5 years of age, and died early in his sixth year without ever having made a public season, so that Belle Price is one of the very few colts ever sired by him.
