## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

A Very Big Fire.

LYNN, Mass., Nov. 26.—Lynn, the city of shoes, was visited this afternoon by the greatest fire in its history, and with two exceptions the conflagration is the most disastrous that ever visited New England. The fire started about noon, raged over eight hours, devastated a square mile of the business section of the city, and caused a loss estimated at \$10,000,000. In fact the greater part of Ward Four is wiped out, as regards the important shoe manufacturing blocks and prominent place of business.

Randall Sick.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—Congressman Randall is a very sick man, and has not been able to leave his bed for a month. His son said last evening that there is not the slightest probability that he will be able to attend the opening session of the house, and that the family entertain grave fears that it will be impossible for him to take part in the deliberations of the session at all.

Two Bad Smugglers.

PORT TOWNSEND, Nov. 26.—Alfred Towers and J. F. McComber, smugglers captured in Whatcom county with fifty pounds of smuggled opium, had a preliminary examination to-day. Towers was released on \$100 cash bail, and McComber was held in \$300 bonds for trial. Each of the prisoners endeavored to enlist the court's sympathy by turning state's evidence.

One of the Victims.

ER VERANO, Cal., Nov. 26.—The remains of A. Alfieri, one of the Italian woodchoppers who, with others, was struck by the cyclone on Hood's mountain. The body was impaled on the broken limb of a tree ten yards from where the camp had been and had evidently been hurled through the air by the wind.

A Big Suit.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 26.—The trial of the suit brought by Charles Frankenthal against the Southern Pacific Railroad Company to recover \$50,000 was begun to-day. The plaintiff sets forth that on the 18th of last February he purchased from the company a first class ticket for Chicago via Sacramento and Portland. He boarded the train at Oakland and had gone as far on his journey as Suisun, between here and Sacramento, when the conductor, after examining the ticket for which he had paid \$97.50, put the same in his pocket and forcibly ejected the plaintiff from the car because plaintiff would not sign his name to the ticket as requested by the conductor.

Steam Heat.

SEATTLE, Nov. 26.—A company has been formed in this city which proposes to heat all buildings with steam for a distance of two miles through the business portion of the city. A number of the most prominent business men of the city are behind it. Contracts for three blocks of buildings are secured. The new company will put in a one hundred and twenty five thousand dollar plant.
