

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Tuesday evening, Nov. 26th. Present—Mayor, Recorder, Marshal and all Councilmen.

The following bills were ordered paid: Albany Iron Works, \$6.25; W E Kelley, \$5.75; Foshay & Mason, \$32.45; G L Savage, \$1.50; Fritz Bender, \$12; John Hoffman, \$14.50; I F Hadley, \$27; Fort-miller & Irving, \$6; N J Henton, \$22.45; Santiam Lumbering Co, \$54.18; John Jones, \$78; W N Miller, \$70; J O White-sides, \$28.59; cest bills \$42.65; T Dought-nen, \$2.50.

Several sidewalk improvements were ordered.

The petition of Peter Riley and others for prohibition of cess pools was laid on table for the present.

The matter of cleaning First Street, was referred with power to act.

Petition of L H Montanye and others asking for sidewalk on Broadalbin Street west side, 7th to 9th sts, was presented and granted.

Ord 197, providing that fire limits shall include that part of city from Callpooa to Baker from River to middle of blocks between Second and Third streets, was read twice and referred.

Ord 198, providing for material and manner of building sidewalks on First street and Washington and Callpooa, First to Third, was read twice and referred.

Ord 199, for naming streets in H's 3rd and 4th additions follows: Hoise, Sherman, Oak, Pine, Harrison. Cleveland and Denver, was read three times and unanimously passed.

Ord 200 providing for giving the Western Union T Co the right to stretch wires through city and erect poles was read twice and referred.

Mr A D Baker applied on behalf of the A O U W lodge for the purchase of two to four acres of city property east of Albany for a cemetery. Referred.

Applications of Hale Beckstein and R F Whitman for license to sell liquor were read and granted.

Matter of putting electric lights at height contracted for was referred, with directions that Mr Allen be notified to raise the lights.

Harness Manufactured At Home.

This is the kind of a news item the Democrat likes to make. Without any bluster the hve young firm of Thompson & Overman have added a manufacturing and wholesale department to their harness and saddlery business. At considerable expense they have purchased the most improved machinery, and secured the services of an expert a workman as there is on the coast, from the East, and are now manufacturing their own harnesses including, doing all branches of the work, including parts always imported from eastern factories. Now they only purchase the hardware. This is not done anywhere else in the Northwest, if on the coast. Already the firm has a good stock on hand, which has the merit of being superior to imported harness, and yet they can lay them down to the trade at the same, or less price. Besides their large retail business they propose pushing the wholesale department, which will necessitate the employment of an increasing number of hands as the business enlarges, which it is bound to do. The quality of the harnesses they are now manufacturing is astonishing old horse men here. The experience of seeing entire bridles, including the blinds, and the housings of harnesses manufactured at home is a novel one. This is a home industry that deserves the support of the people.

LOCAL RECORD

NOW FOR BAKER CITY.—Last evening a special train from Corvallis brought to this city J P Faull, C F Hype, E H Mix, M L Tichner and T F Campbell of Baker City, being a committee of the Board of Trade of that town appointed to confer with the officials of the Oregon Pacific R R Co with a view to secure the construction of the main line of the O P railroad through Baker City, or in case that can not be done, the construction of a branch from the main line of the O P to that town. Quite a number of Albany's business men met these gentlemen at the law office of J K Weatherford, where speeches were made by Messrs. Campbell, Faull, Mix, Hype and Tichner, explaining the necessity of the construction of such a road as well as the benefits which Baker City and Albany would derive from the building of it. Remarks responsive to the zeal and earnestness of the members of the committee were made by Messrs. Cowan, Lanning, Cusick and Siftes, all expressing earnest sympathy in the success of this new enterprise and pleading the hearty co-operation and assistance of the people of Albany to make the undertaking a complete success. From what we see of the zeal and earnestness of the committee we should say that Baker City has learned the lesson that no town can grow and thrive without the active and untiring zeal and co-operation of its own citizens. It is to be hoped that this will be a success.
