Mrs J B Luper has been quite sick. We are glad to announce to her many friends that she is on the improve.

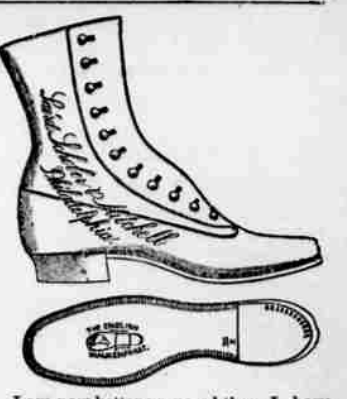
