GRAVE RESPONSIBILITY.

The Philadelphia Times, heretofore the organ of Sam Randall has this to say of the duties and responsibilities of the republican party: If the party that has assumed absolute control of the government to-day had been honest with the people in the battles fought to win authority, there would not be serious complications to embarrass its leaders now; but fortunately for both the party and the country, campaign promises were deceitfully made to conflicting interests and tribute extorted from all, and now all claim the fulfillment of the bond.

One of the first important petitions that will be presented to the new Congress will come from Republican New England, headed by the republican Governor of Massachusetts and signed by the representative manufacturers of that republican stronghold, demanding free coal, free wool, free iron ore, free scrap iron and free raw materials generally; and the reason given for this earnest appeal to Congress is that without free raw materials the industries of New England, now languishing and many on the verge of bankruptcy, must perish. The memorial is not dictated by political considerations; On the contrary, it is dictated by the sternest necessity, and it must be respected or next year will not show a single republican State in New England outside of Vermont. It is not a theory but a condition that makes New England republicans demand thorough tariff reform, and that demand must be respected or the New England industries will respect themselves even at the cost of their long accepted political faith.

The demand of the New England manufacturers is in entire accord with the true protective policy of the nation and of the world, as we stand alone among all the protective governments of the earth in taxing raw materials; and it would be an easy problem to solve but for the promises made and the party tribute exacted from the wool-growers and iron-ore producers. The Senate tariff bill, carefully prepared as a campaign document and as a basis of campaign extortion upon all interest, is now the fly in the republican ointment. It will high cost Senator Allison, its author, the Legislature of his State along with the Governor, and it may cost him his seat in the Senate; and the election of a democratic Governor who had voted for free wool-growing in the State of Ohio, emphasizes the admonition of the people of the West against oppressive taxes upon the necessities of life and of industry.

The wool-growers of the far West and Northwest were distinctly promised in creased tariff taxes on wool by the Senate bill, and they paid their tribute on the distinct faith of the bill solemnly passed by the Senate. They paid spot cash for higher taxes on wool, and they demand that the contract be fulfilled to the letter. Here is the gravest complication that confronts the Congress, and even the most consummate skill in political leadership cannot give free or cheaper wool to save the manufacturers from bankruptcy and maintain present or give increased protection to wool-growers. There is a middle ground in most issues on which an embarrassed party may take refuge, but there is no middle ground between the policy of free raw materials and increased taxes on wool; and with woolen failures multiplying by scores, the issue is one that cannot be postponed.

Mr St John, president of a national bank in New York, is advocating the unlimited coinage of silver. The Kansas politicians are fighting this idea with all their might, under the impression that it is John Peter St John. It isn't, boys, so give the silver a show.
