### MANIFESTLY WRONG.

Heretofore republican papers have suggested as a way to get rid of the surplus in the treasury, that the Secretary of the treasury should buy bonds and retire them, saying that there was a great saving of interest thereby. Secretary Windom does not accept this view. In his report he says:  
It is manifestly wrong to take money from the people for the cancellation of bonds, to the saving of only about 2 per cent. of interest when it is worth to them, perhaps, three times as much in their business. It is rather through a reduction of customs receipts and internal taxes that an unnecessary accumulation of money in the Treasury should be avoided.

It is regretted that the Secretary has not the courage to take the bull by the horns and say plainly that the welfare of the great majority of the people would be best subserved by the reduction of customs duties on those articles which are necessary to the comfort of all the people at large, such as coal, iron, wool, salt, sugar, woolen goods and so forth. But the time is rapidly approaching when these reductions will be made in obedience to the expressed will of the voters of the country.

**A Good Example.**  
PENDLETON, Or., Dec. 13.—The wheat warehouses are about empty in this country. Only 4500 bushels remain in the Pendleton warehouse, and this will be shipped in a few days. There are only 3000 bushels in the warehouses at Brown's station, and none scarcely in other warehouses along the line.

**Was Hanged.**  
EMPIRE CITY, Or., Dec. 13.—John Gilman, who murdered Mrs Etenhover and child, was hanged to day in the jail yard. He mounted the scaffold at 1 o'clock with a firm step, murmured a few indistinct words, and bid the crowd farewell. Death was instantaneous.

**A Distinguished Act.**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Thomas Potter, a well known citizen, died yesterday, aged 83. He was one of those who drew Lafayette's carriage into Washington from Baltimore in 1824.

**Not Yet Found.**  
SEATTLE, Dec. 13.—The search parties still claim to be searching the passage from one end to the other, the bodies of the unfortunate hunting party, Dr Thomas Minor, G Morris Haller and E Louis Cox have not been found; yet with painful toil and increasing vigilance the search is prosecuted not only by those incited by the hope of reward, but in the main by those whose only incentives are love and respect for the unfortunate trio and for their sorrowing friends.

**Not in Seattle.**  
BOSTON, Dec. 13.—A meeting between John L. Sullivan and Peter Jackson at the California Athletic Club within five months for a purse of \$15,000 is now assured. This morning Captain Cooke received a telegram from Captain Fulda which stated that Jackson had called a willingness to meet Sullivan provided he had five months to get ready in.

**Bad Officials.**  
SAN DIEGO, Dec. 13.—County Supervisors Wood, Buck, Stice and Mayor Gunn were today cited to appear before Judge Paterbaugh next Tuesday on complaint of Colonel Horne, foreman of the late grand jury, which, it will be remembered, charged them with dereliction of official duty and squandering over \$100,000 illegally of county funds.
