RICH STRIKE.—In our issue of the 12th inst. we clipped an item from the Independence Tribune, giving an account of the finding of rich mines on one of the tributaries of the Willamette by a Mr. Durand and his partner. Mr. D. D. Miller, of Millers, in this county, informs us that these mines belong to his brother, Geo. S. Miller, and a couple of men named Pierson, who discovered them some two years ago and built a cabin thereon. They left this cabin about three or four weeks ago to be gone a few days, and on returning found some one had entered their cabin and taken their grub and tools away. Mr. Miller showed us a number of specimens taken from these quartz mines, and they are pronounced by men of mining experience here to be very rich. These discoveries have prospected the ledge for a distance of 3,000 feet and find it rich all that distance. In a short time this summer they beat out in a little \$300 worth of gold. The ledge is located about 12 miles west of Bohemia mines.

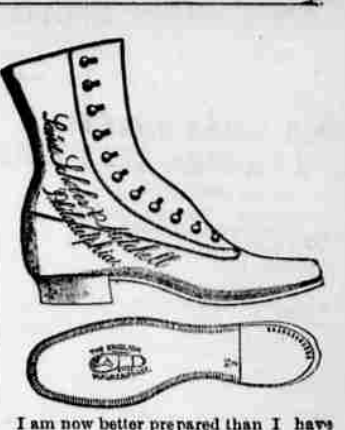
