HUBBARD CASE.—The matter of application of Lena Dubrulle asking for the custody of Barbara, daughter of and Mrs H C Hubbard, be taken from parents and be transferred to some violent and charitable institution, came before County Judge Blackburn in the Court room this forenoon. A MARION CO. MURDER.—Near Sublimity, Marion county, only a few miles from the Linn county line, on Sunday afternoon Mr William Riggs, a farmer, was instantly killed. Mr Thomas Hammond and son, Ora, a young boy, of Stayton, were the only ones present. Mr Hammond's version of the affair as given by the Salem Journal was as follows. Mr Hammond and son were at his father's. They were joined by Mr Riggs and went hunting. A bevy of quail was started up and Mr Hammond shot one bird. Then his son wished to have a shot at the rest. To this the father consented, and as he and Mr Riggs were directing the boy how to shoot, the latter stood to the left of the boy and almost at the end of the gun. As he raised the piece to fire the father says he was very nervous, not being used to shooting, and as the bird flew to the left the boy hastily and excitedly fired, lodging the entire charge in the right side of Mr Riggs' head and jaw, blowing one side of his head entirely off and causing instant death. The neighbors, though claim that there had been a quarrel between the Hammonds and Riggs, and the gun was found with both barrels loaded. The father and son were arrested for murder; but protest their innocence. The case promises to be an exciting one, and the neighborhood is said to be greatly stirred up over the matter.
