TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

A Horrible Crime.
NILES, O., Dec. 22.—The community was
startled this evening by the discovery of one
of the most wholesale and bloody butcheries
that has ever occurred in this section of the
state. The victim, five in number, are
Charles Shelar, and wife, and three children,
and the crime is supposed to have taken place
at an early hour this morning. When the in-
human deed was discovered at 5 o'clock this
evening, all five bodies were stiff and cold in
death, with their throats cut from ear to ear.
Shelar and his wife were lying together across
the foot of the bed and the three children
were on the floor in different parts of the house.
Shelar of late drank heavily, and it is rumo-
red that he and his wife did not live happily.
The theory advanced is, that Shelar, in a fit
of madness, cut the throats of his wife and
children and then his own. Shelar purchas-
ed a razor on Saturday evening.

Malletta King.
ALMA, Samoa, Dec. 7.—King Malletta has
at last been formally recognized as ruler of
Samoa by the consuls of the United States,
Great Britain and Germany. About a month
ago the consuls issued a proclamation declar-
ing that the Berlin conference had agreed to
recognize Malletta as King, and advising the
natives to acknowledge him as such. Tamasee
replied by saying that his followers were
willing that such a course should be taken.
Malletta and Tamasee agreed to the suggestion
and the native chiefs of the island also signed
a document, acknowledging Malletta as
king.

A Rare Fight.
ST. LOUIS, Dec. 22.—Morgan reports have
been received of a riot in progress at Foot's
Camp, Miss., sixty five miles from Memphis.
The trouble was precipitated by a fight be-
tween a white man and a negro, in which the
latter was worsted. He went out from town,
collected a party of friends and returned to
clean up the victor. The whites rallied and a
fight ensued, in which half the people were
wounded but none killed. The latest advices
were that everybody was in arms, and further
trouble is expected.

The Floods Continue.
COLUMBIA, Dec. 22.—The river stands twenty
five feet above low water mark and is rising
fast. It has been raining steadily for twenty
four hours and still continues. This afternoon
there was no prospect of clear weather. Near-
ly all the large landowners on Grand Island
have suffered losses except A. H. Rose, one of
the head men in the reclamation company.
The general opinion is that his land will be
flooded if the high winds now blowing contin-
ue many more hours.

Kentucky Cyclone.
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 22.—The town of
Painville, Ky., was visited by a destructive
storm of wind and rain early this morning.
Several dwellings and three business houses
were swept away by a cyclone which passed
through the country town. Grant and James
North, brothers, received serious injuries.
There were but only one hurt although several
people lost valuable property. The loss
is estimated at about \$50,000.
