THE BROWNVILLE R. R.—If a read is built from Brownsville to a connection with the Oregon Pacific, as is now proposed, Albany should make an effort to be the connecting point. The following from the Brownsville Times, though, either shows that that paper has a spite against our city, or that there is really talk of another scheme. The Times says: "Since writing the article in last week's Times about the proposed railroad from Albany to Brownsville, there has been a big interest aroused in favor of Corvallis. We have talked with several of our leading citizens and find that many of them are in favor of Corvallis as the connecting point. By referring to the map of the country we can easily see that Corvallis is the most direct route to a seaport, and the shipping facilities are as good, or nearly so, at Corvallis as they are at Albany. By running to Corvallis it would give Southern Lin county several miles more of railroad on which the taxes would be collected and paid in the county funds. Of course, when we say county funds, we mean the new county that could be made as a natural outgrowth, and which would surely meet with universal favor in this end of the county."

Now these cities claim from two to four times as many people; but it will be well to temperate for the census of 1890 is almost here, when the figures will speak for themselves.

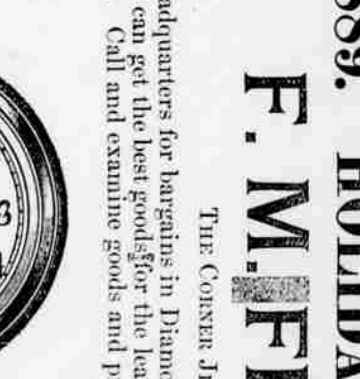
ASTORIA PROPERTY.

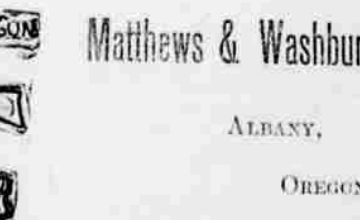
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
