HE CANDID.

It is best to be candid in politics as it is in other matters. An erroneous cause or principle can not withstand the light of reason, and therefore candor can never be used as a means to promote such cause or principle. Such cause or principle must depend upon sophistry and cunningly worded phrases to make the error appear for the truth. The Times Mountaineer says:

"While we do not believe in protecting any industry which cannot be successfully followed in this country, and which, as a result, would be a direct tax on the consumer, we do believe that, if the government would offer pecuniary inducements for the cultivation of some articles, they could be grown to an advantage in the United States. For instance, the product of sugar in this country has not been sufficient to supply the demand, and the protective duty in the Mills bill of last session would add to the price of the article."

Nearly every republican member of congress, when the Mills bill was up for consideration and the item of jute was being discussed, took ground against taking the 20 per cent duty from that article and putting it on the free list. Herman Mitchell and Dolph all voted against putting that article on the free list. This duty on the on jute is an attempt "to protect an industry that can not be successfully followed in this country" and which as a result is a direct tax upon the consumer—mainly the farmer. The Mountaineer well knows that jute is not, and can not be raised in this country and yet, it has never raised its voice against this tax on the consumer, the farmer. Its representatives in congress voted against taking this tax from jute and it approved their course. When its words might have had some weight in promoting the interests of millions of people without injury to any one, it remained silent. This is merely a scheme to dodge the issue when it is up, and meet it face to face when it is not being considered. The Mountaineer in the most uncandid way says the protective duty on sugar in the Mills bill of last session would add to the price of the article." The only logical inference to be drawn from this statement is, that the framers and supporters of the Mills bill had placed a duty on sugar that was not already provided for in the then existing law. But such was not the case as the Mills bill made a material reduction of the duty on sugar. The Mountaineer makes the statement evidently for the purpose of keeping alive a prejudice against the democratic demand for a material reduction of the tariff tax. That there should be a reduction of the duty on sugar hardly admits of a question, but, with all the loud-mouthed demands made by the Oregonian, Mountaineer and other protection organs of the tariff monopoly a year ago for free sugar, never a word, the republican party will not make a reduction. They were not candid when they demanded free sugar. The Mountaineer would have congress grant a bonus to those who will engage in raising beet sugar. It thinks this would not be paternal government. On the contrary it would be difficult to conceive of a more odious form of paternal government. It would be saying to one class of people that the government would tax another class to raise bounty money to pay to the former class to make it successful in business. Upon the very face of it the proposition is an outrageous one, and we can not understand how an intelligent man, imbued with the spirit of fair dealing between freemen could, for a moment entertain it.
