A SLENNED COMPANY.—The one hundred or more Albany people who attended the presentation of "Ingomar, the Barbarian," by the John S Lindsay Dramatic Company, at the Opera House last evening, were fortunate. The play, a classic one, was given with a dramatic power rarely equaled in Albany. John S Lindsay, though not known to us before, is a remarkably strong actor, doing some of the finest work seen on the stage, and is as far above most of the actors who storm the town as can be imagined. E H Felt is a great Polydore, in that peculiar character displaying a splendid talent. T R Shroeder was peculiarly a good Myron, the Armorer; Miss Lucella Lindsay, the leading lady, sustains the part of Parthena with great naturalness, her enunciation and expression being excellent. The support generally is extra. The troupe is unquestionably one of the best ever in the city, and we have no doubt that in the character of Richlieu, Lindsay can discount Mlyn. The high order of the plays presented by this splendid company deserve the support of our people.

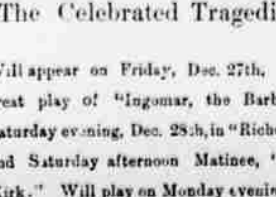
