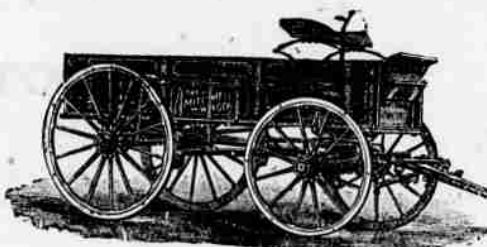

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

A Peculiar Foot Race.

INDEPENDENCE, Or., Jan. 8.—This afternoon some 200 persons gathered at the race grounds south of town to witness a foot race between W. M. Martin, a McMinnville sprinter and Harry Gilbert, a resident of this town, recently from the East. The track was scraped out of the snow and was 100 yards long. The stakes were \$250 a side. A bad start was made by Gilbert, and Martin got at least ten feet start; Gilbert crept up on Martin, and when within thirty feet of the goal was almost abreast, when Martin fell. A few feet further Gilbert fell, and both scrambled to get under the line first. The judges decided it no race, and after much quarelling it was decided to run it over at McMinnville on Saturday the 18th.

A Young Suicide.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8.—Little Clem Flint, the 11 year old son of William C. Flint, an attorney at law, committed suicide this morning by shooting himself in the head. The story of the boy's death, as told by his parents, is a very sorrowful one. The family live on Fell street, and the boy, who was an obedient child disappeared from the house yesterday afternoon after returning from school. Search was made for him without success, and as he had not returned home this morning his father left the house to report the case to the police. As he was passing along Grove street he saw his little boy on the opposite side of the street, and called to him. The boy started to run, and rushed into the house of Mrs. Clappenburg. When he reached the hall he drew a revolver and shot himself in the temple.

The Old Story.

COLFAX, Jan. 8.—Murderer Blanton took the stand to-day in his own defense. He asserted that he was addicted to liquor, and while under its influence could see people flying in the air, snakes crawling around him, and other hideous things. During his speech he made wild and frantic gestures. He finally took his seat, apparently having produced no effect.
