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LOCAL RECORD

WAIVED EXAMINATION.—Marshal Hoffman returned from Ashland this morning accompanied by Pete Montgomery, who had been arrested on complaint of Thos Harris, charged with larceny from baille. He was taken before Justice Humphrey, waived examination and was held under \$200 bonds to await the action of the grand jury. The bonds were furnished. Pete's version of the matter is that he did not leave on account of the Harris matter but because of some trouble with a tramp stranger in which he hit him over the head with a cue. He thought he had hurt him worse than he had. The tramp left the city the next day, after being calloosed. On being arrested Pete had \$50 on his person. The general sentiment seems to be that Harris needs a guardian anyway, else he wouldn't be so careless in money matters.

THE BIGGEST.—The following from the Drain Echo is rather the biggest "fish" story yet reported. A short time since, only a few miles from Roseburg, a man walking came suddenly upon a full-grown coyote. Giving a terrible yell and springing at the coyote, he frightened the animal so terribly that, as it ran, it turned its head first one side and the other, looking back at its pursuer. So thoroughly frightened was the animal that the man caught it with one hand by the hind legs, while with the other hand, he cut its throat with the pocket knife. It was a cold day for the coyote, but pleasant to the person who captured the prize.

A KNOTTY MATTER.—About 6,000,000 feet of saw logs are jammed in the mouth of the Mohawk and the several owners are in Eugene seeking to formulate some plan by which the logs can be divided, and the loggers can get their pay, says the Guard. The logs are inextricably mingled, and it is likely that owners will have to divide them pro rata. The creek is full of logs for two miles from its mouth, where it empties into the McKenzie. A portion of the logs will be held in the Mohawk until spring. About all the legal talent of Eugene has been engaged this week in trying to adjust the responsibility of the several mill men to the loggers.

DIGS POTATOES TOO.—All kinds of charges have been made against the Chinese peasants; but the following from Argenti, Marion county, rather breaks the damels back: "The false, fleeting, perfidious Mongolian peasant has come. He paid the premises of Mr Hult a visit in his absence and kindly dug all his potatoes and carried them away. Mr Hult says he would not complain if he had left him enough for seed as it may be necessary to have these birds as they are a foreign importation and therefore very valuable. But as the heathens have been protected by law for nearly five years, would it not be well for the next legislature to offer a bounty for their bills for the next five years?"

DIED ALONE.—Harvey Paget residing in the Sluslaw in Lane county, twelve miles above the head of tide, was found dead in his cabin, Jan 3rd. He had evidently been sitting in a chair reading a newspaper when the fatal stroke came, and had fallen forward on his face. When he had probably been dead several days. He was of English descent, a bachelor and about 67 years of age. He had a homestead claim on the land on which he lived, and left no personal property of any value.

Application of Street Railway for right of way on county road was continued.

The name of East Albany was changed to Albany precinct, and the following was taken off Albany precinct and will form East Albany precinct: The portion East and North of line running along Jackson street to Ninth, along Ninth to Sanderson bridge road and along said road to the center of Santiam river. Voting place, Farmers warehouse.

Tangent precinct begins on Callipool Creek, on the line bet 11 and 12 S R 4 w, running to N W cor of Sec 3, tp 11, S R 3 w, forming the portion west and south thereof. Voting place, school house at tangent.

Peoria precinct will begin at a point on the south boundary line of Sec 30, tp 12, S R 4 w, at intersection of east bank of Willamette river, running east to S W cor Sec 26, tp 8, S R 4 w, thence west 1 mile, thence south to south boundary line of tp 13, South R 4 west; thence west to Willamette river; thence down river to place of beginning.
