LOOKS LIKE ENTERPRISE.—A meeting is called at Halsey Feb. 1st at which every man of an enterprising disposition is requested to be present. The object of the meeting will be to take under advisement a plan for furnishing water power to a large flouring mill at that place. It is proposed to tap the waters of the McKinnis river, at some point near Coburg; there being natural water way extending nearly the entire distance from this point to Halsey, through which the McKinnis frequently overflows at high water. Along this course a canal can easily be opened to within a few miles above the town, where it may be turned out and brought down, furnishing there a fall of from 12 to 14 feet. Thence the water may be carried to Shield, Tangent and why not to Albany? This proposition is made feasible when it is taken into consideration, that it has been proven by practical demonstration that the natural declivity of the valley toward the north is about 5 1/2 feet to the mile. This a considerable scheme and will conduce greatly to the industrial resources of this section of the country.
